No pickets but no mail

While Acton's mail service has ground to a complete halt, Rockwood's has been affected little by the national mail strike.

Some 23,000 inside postal workers across Canada walked off the job a week ago yesterday (Tuesday) after failing to come to an agreement with the Treasury Board concerning maternity pay and wages.

Letter carriers in Acton have been laid off, due to lack of work, while only Assistant Postmaster Chris McMillan and renegade inside worker Vic Bristow remain in the office.

Pickets have not been set up yet in Acton, Mrs. McMillan noted.

Look for landscape architects for library

Halton Hills Library Board is looking for a landscape architect to make plans for sprucing up the grounds of the Acton Library.

For several months Norm Elliott has been pushing for landscaping work and the matter was again discussed at a recent board meeting.

Betsy Cornwell, chief librarian, reported she discussed the matter with town purchasing agent Hugh Patterson and they came up with a list of local landscape architects and nurseries to be contacted.

Roy Booth suggested Elliott and a committee should discuss the project with some landscape architects and then decide which one should

Downtown grant

Halton Hills will receive a grant for the downtown studies being carried out in Acton and Georgetown. Monday council received a letter from Minister of Housing Claude Bennett informing the municipality Queen's Park will pay 50 per cent of the study cost or \$15,000, whichever amount is less. The province will send the town \$7,500 shortly while the balance will be payable when the study is completed and adopted by council. The study must be finished and approved by council by the end of this year.

Man injured in collision

One man is in hospital and two others escaped major injuries last Wednesday following a two vehicle crash on Highway 7 just east of Acton.

Roger Cunningham, 45 of RR 1, Terra Cotta was taken to Georgetown District Hospital with foot injuries and facial cuts after his 1970 station wagon was in collision with a 1974 truck belonging to Frank Heller and Company, Acton. The driver of the truck, George J. Rowsell, 28, 350 Orville Rd. and a passenger, his brother Robert Rowsell, 31, of Guelph received minor injuries.

Milton OPP say the station wagon was westbound on Highway 7 when it struck the left rear of the truck, wrenching the back wheels and axle off the

chassis. The truck rolled over, coming to rest on its side, causing an estimated \$5,000 damage to the right side of the trailer portion and the cab. The windshield was also smashed in the crash.

The station wagon received an estimated \$3,000 damage after the left front fender was torn from the car. The front of the car was smashed in almost to the back door.

Debris was scattered everywhere, and traffic was blocked in the eastbound lane.

Halton Regional Police were on the scene directing traffic, and the Acton Firefighters were called to hose down the truck which was leaking gasoline.

The accident occurred just west of the Fourth Line.
