Secure home before leaving

Going on holidays? Worried about leaving the old homestead behind, and vulnerable to burglars and vandals? Constable Scott Pringle, Crime Prevention Officer for the Halton Regional Police, has some suggestions on how to make your home more secure while away.

The biggest thing to remember is not to let it look unoccupied. This is where neighbors come in handy, he said. Either stop the mail, newspapers and other deliveries, or have a neighbor collect it. Leave a key with him and arrange for someone to cut the grass. Also, have the neighbor park his car in your driveway.

While away, make sure your neighbor knows where you are going and a phone number if possible where he can reach you in case of emergency, Pringle said. Also inform him of who is going to be at your home while you're away, such as the gardener, a repairman, etc. Maybe even ask your neighbor to sit in the house some evening.

Investment in a timer is a good idea, Pringle explains. Lights and radio can be turned on and off, giving the impression someone is home.

Patio doors can be secured in major ways. Pringle recommends putting a piece of wood in the track so the door cannot be forced open. Another method is to install pins in the track so the window cannot be lifted out.

Building assembly's spiritual awakening goal of new minister

An empty church is a challenge, says the new minister at the Evangelical Tabernacle Pentecostal Assembly.

Rev. Cliff Hodgson, who has taken the place of Rev. Brian Rennie says his main goal is to fill the church, a challenge, he added, because it's not even half full.

He, his wife Florence and two children Denyse and Dana came to Acton three weeks ago from Dresden, near Chatham, where he was Pastor for two years.

Before that they were in Englehart, near Kirkland Lake in northern Ontario. Rev. Hodgson, who's from Owen Sound has been in the ministry for about six years, he said.

He said they find Acton a "friendly" town. "It's what they call a real bedroom town," he said with people who live here, working all over the place.
