Going on holidays? Worried about leaving old homestead behind, and vulnerable to burglars and vandals? Constable Scott Pringle, Crime Preven- precinct. tion Officer for the Halton Regional Police. has some suggestions on how to make your home

more secure while away. The biggest thing to remember is not to let it look unoccupied. This is where neighbors come in handy, he said. Either stop the mail, news-papers and other deliveries, or have a neighbor collect it. Leave a key with him and arrange for someone to cut the grass. Also, have the neighbor park his car in your driveway.

While away, make sure your neighbor knows where you are going and a phone number if possible where he can reach you in case of emergency, Pringle said. Also inform him of who is going to be at your home while you're away, such as the gardener, a repairman, etc. Maybe even ask your neighbor to sit in

the house some evening. Investment in a timer is a good idea, Pringle explains. Lights and radio can be turned on and off, glving the impression someone is home.

Patio doors can be secured in major ways. Pringle recommends putting a plece of wood in the track so the door cannot be forced open. Another method is to install pins in the track so the window cannot be


