Mail flows again as strikers return

Inside postal workers have returned to their job after a 42 day strike which crippled mail delivery across the country. Acton workers resumed work with the first shift at 5 a.m. yesterday (Tuesday) morning. More shifts came in at their regular times of 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. according to assistant postmaster Chris McMillan. Letter boxes around town were

unsealed Monday. Letter carriers were back making the rounds yesterday, although there was not much to deliver, McMillan says. There was no backlog as carriers worked until there was no more to be delivered from the local office. They were laid off shortly after the strike started. In an average week, McMillan said, the Acton post office processes about 55,000

pieces of first class mail, 34,000 of which is incoming. She has no idea what this week will be like, she noted. Because most larger local companies have hired couriers to deliver bills, she does not expect a big surge in outgoing mail, McMillan said. Meanwhile, inside workers themselves are "glad to be back to work," according to Grace Perry.

Lots of booths set for Leathertown Market

Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed will be on hand with his banjo, a jazz group from M.Z. Bennett School will play, Kent Tocher and Eddie McMullen will sing and Joyce Carpenter's students will dance up a storm. Of course there will be the year-one wind-up Actario draw for bonus prizes, \$350 and a super, secret trip draw. And the Leathertown Market day will be a great time for shoppers to pick up their Actario tickets for next year.

No objection to pit extension

Taxi fares climb up

Taxi fares are going up in Halton Hills. Council last Tuesday night agreed to allow cabbles to up their fares to help the privately run companies keep up with increasing operation costs. The last increase was in October of 1978. The increase will see the starting rate up 20 cents to \$1.00 for the first 1/7 of a kilometer, and 10 cents for the first additional 1/7 km. Cost for each additional km is 70 cents. Waiting time is \$12.00 an hour.

The increase puts Halton Hills taxi drivers on a par with Milton. Rates are slightly less than Oakville and Burlington fares. For passengers wishing the driver to handle luggage, cab owners can now charge 50 cents for a three cubic foot trunk and 10 cents for each piece of hand baggage or grocery bag.

Wheelchairs will be carried free. Senior citizens will receive a 10 per cent discount upon presentation of identification.
