Leathertown Market is going 'like house on fire'

Plans for the August 29 Leathertown Market are "going like a house on fire" according to organizer Ted Tyler.

The marketplace is being held in conjunction with the last Actario Draw that day and is featuring 35 confirmed booths with more under consideration. Willow St. North from Mill to Bower is being closed down for the day while local and out-of-town booths will be set up.

Free buses will run from Georgetown and Milton, driving through the residential areas of both communities, to bring the most people possible to Acton's downtown that day.

Festivities start at 8:45 a.m. with the Leathertown Pled Piper leading the Acton Citizen's Band in a parade from the

band hall to the mall, arriving about 9 a.m. The traditional rat will be following the Pled Piper.

The opening ceremonies and the opening of the booths will take place in front of the town hall, the building which is the focal point of the draw, and thus the marketplace. Long time merchant Elma Braida will perform the ribbon cutting ceremonies.

Celesthenics co-ordinator Pat Wood will lead a Health Hustle at 9:15 a.m. and at 9:30 a.m. the Citizens' Band will entertain with a program of marches and pops favorites.

The McKenzie-Smith Jazz Group will swing through a series of modern dance routines at 10:30 and the Joyce Carpenter Dancers from

the Acton School of Dance will perform at 11 a.m.

At its traditional time, the Actario draw will be held at 11:30 a.m. A presentation of certificates of appreciation will be handed out to worthy recipients by the Town Hall Restoration Committee, followed by the final draw of the first series. A super secret Trip of the Month will be won by a lucky ticket holder, as well as the draw for the weekly \$350 prize money and bonus prizes.

It's Banjo Time at 12:15 with MPP Julian Reed and his brother, Kent Tocher, with special guest vocal appearance by Ed McMullen, will entertain at 1 p.m.

At 2:30 square dancing will be provided by local talent in Country Time. At 4 p.m. the Leathertown Market Day will wind up.

Throughout the day, booths will be set up with merchants coming from Beamsville, Toronto, St. Catharines, Brantford, Burlington and Meaford.

Child recovering struck by car

A 2½ year old Limehouse girl is making a steady recovery at Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, after suffering a fractured skull when she was struck by a car Wednesday afternoon.

Halton Regional Police Officer John Lyver said Theresa Scott was with a group of children on the soft shoulder of the rural village road, east of the store, when she ran out in front of the vehicle.

Lyver said the driver, Shauna Berube, 32, of R.R. 1, Georgetown, had two children in her vehicle and was not exceeding the village speed limit of 50 km.

The young child was taken by ambulance to Georgetown hospital and then transferred to Sick Children's.

The day following the accident, an emotional Randy Scott, father of the injured child, phoned to state his concern with speeding through the small village. Mr. Scott said with no sidewalks in the village and no regular police patrol, speeding through the village is a very dangerous problem.


Mr. Scott, a truck driver himself, praised J.C. Duff drivers who travelling through the village use extra caution. "Right after the accident I called J.C. Duff and since then I noticed any trucks hauling for Duff were exercising extra caution, travelling under the speed limit."

Constable Lyver said no charges will be laid.
