kids interested in the program. The program was supposed to run for three weeks at both Acton and Georgetown, but the Acton school only registered enough students for one week. "Its cost is less than day care and babysitting and it's completely supervised. The parents don't have to worry about their kids getting into trouble," said McMahon. The teacher believes in his program, both his children are taking part in it.

The seven student instructors at the school are on loan from the Parks and Recreation Day and Sports Camps. They have built up experience from the camps and learn more while working with teachers McMahon, Bob McKay and Grant Clatworthy. "Our main reason for setting up the camp was because it's only available in the big centres, Burlington and Oakville. The rec department has a good sports camp but I felt the need for a little more skill-oriented program. We emphasize fun but we also try for skill development," explained McMahon.

Take a dive

Scuba course offered at Acton Pool

Ever wonder what goes on underneath us in lakes, ponds and even the oceans? Just ask a scuba diver why he likes observing and exploring the bottoms of the local waters.

If you interested in learning how to scuba, Richard Weiss may have the answer you are looking for.

Mr. Weiss is a proficient scuba diver and in the past years has taken that ability and taught it to beginners at McGill University in Montreal. Now, Richard is hoping to bring his underwater expertise to Georgetown, Milton and Acton as he teaches locals basic scuba, sport diving and an assistant instructors training course at Acton Lions Pool in Acton beginning the end of September.

Weiss has been teaching scuba since 1958 in Montreal at a local 'Y' and then in 1966 he took his course to McGill University where it became an extracurricular program. The program still remains at McGill according to Weiss although he has moved to Mississauga.

In addition to holding his professional Association Divers Instructors credentials Weiss was a commercial diver in Montreal for the harbour board, and fire departments along with owning his own dive shop business between 1963 and 1969.

Weiss has looked into and will book the Acton Pool as a private business in order to operate the program if enough interest is shown.

Weiss will be offering three courses. The basic diver and sport diver courses are open to anyone between the ages of 15 and 65, who are physically fit. The third course, an assistant instructors course, is

open to any diver that has one years experience and logged 20 dives and ten hours of bottom time.

All three courses that Weiss is teaching are National Association of Underwater Instructors certification courses and anyone completing the course will be a qualified diver.

"I feel the course is unique in the sense that we run basic, sport and assistant instructors simultaneously," commented Weiss of his course. Weiss takes those in the assistant instructor course and they help to train the basic and sport divers. "They're teaching and learning at the same time," says Weiss.

Anyone interested in taking any of the three courses will need a mask, fins and snorkel according to Weiss while the air tanks will be provided.
