# Dynamic duo win in doubles again

"We all played carefully. Normally in a less serious game you'd be a little looser and play a far better level of tennis," explained Duff. "When you play in finals it's usually good tennis or fairly average tennis."

The two thought the men's tourney finals weren't up to the par the foursome usually play. "I don't think any of us played really well," said Ancker.

Ancker said the win came as a surprise to her and her partner.

"Mrs. Geng and I have played a lot together, but we weren't that confident because she's never won before. The two people that won the tournament last year split up this year and played with different partners," she said.

Morris and Duff feel their consistent service was the reason why they topped the men's championship.

"We both held our service. I think that's critical. When you have service you're at the advantage, you're behind the eight ball. If you drop the service once or twice then you have a lot of problems," said Duff.

The newly crowned doubles champion is a newcomer to the Acton tennis scene.

"I just moved from Montreal. I was active in tennis in Montreal in league play and in the local club," he said.

Morris feels talented and experienced partners enabled him to share both doubles titles.

"I've had two good partners, that helps a lot," he said.

Duff has seen many tennis clubs, both large and small. He said Acton Tennis Club could have the makings of a top notch club.

"I think there's a lot of enthusiasm here. They're starting to develop a few talented players and are getting a better level of play," he said.

The club also misses the 'elitism' that hurts many bigger clubs.

"I feel the club is not at all elitist. The players will play better or weaker people—this improves the whole club. A lot of people are very interested in playing," he said.
