Fox in Everton believed rabid

A fox believed to be rabid, was chased by Everton residents Monday night into a corn field behind the village but never found.

Jan Aubut, Everton, told this newspaper Tuesday that parents are keeping their children and pets inside because of the fox.

Guelph OPP was on the scene but the officer didn't see the animal and police said they can't confirm it was rabid. Police haven't reported the incident to government authorities because it is unconfirmed.

Mrs. Aubut says residents believe the fox must be rabid because "it went after" a local farmer's goat in broad daylight, unusual behaviour for a fox.

Men of the village went after the fox in the field with rifles but didn't see it again.
