Principals now termed 'occupiers'

Halton's principals and vice-principals shall be deemed "occupiers" of their schools in accordance with the "Act to Protect Against Trespass to Property."

By naming these people as occupiers, the Halton Board of Education has given them the right to lay charges against trespassers.

Crash in fog

Drivers of two vehicles in collision on Highway 7 in dense fog Monday morning both escaped with minor injuries.

Guelph Provincial Police say the accident happened on Highway 7, 200 metres from Wellington County Road 29, (Eden Mills Road), Dennis Roy, 25, of Hanmer, Ontario was

backing a tractor trailer into a lumber yard driveway, blocking the road. An eastbound car, driven by Craig Richardson, 19, of Guelph, braked and skidded into the trailer of the unit.

Better communication is aim of Halton board

In an effort to improve communications with the public, the Halton Board of Education is considering a newsletter to be sent to Halton homes, and a Community Relations Officer to be hired.

Oakville trustee Janis Millman suggested in June that a newsletter go out to all homes in Halton. Distribution through the school results in just taxpayers with children receiving it, so a method of overall distribution was looked into.

It was estimated at the board meeting Thursday the bi-annual newsletter would cost \$12,000 a year. That includes the cost of printing, mailing and committee expenses.

It was suggested an editorial board comprised of an editor, three trustees, one teacher, student and principal or vice-principal from elementary and secondary, and one administrative assistant be involved in the project.

The hiring of a community relations officer was also discussed as another way in which to more effectively communicate with the public.

This staffer if hired, could serve as editor of the Halton Newsletter. Burlington trustee Cam Jackson suggested with the community relations officer, a newsletter would not be necessary.

The duties of the new person would be to promote a greater understanding by the public and the education system of each other's concerns; to promote greater understanding by individual schools and their local communities of each other's concerns; and to foster better relations between the schools and external agencies. Salary for this position would range from \$25,000 to \$30,000.

Jackson questioned the possibility of having an assistant administrator for the board rather than a public relations officer. He explained with two people carrying the workload, both would have time to project a good image to the public.

George town trustee Betty Fisher felt no decision should be made on the officer position until the new director of education takes over his post in January. She said Wally Beevor wants less administrative personnel around him, and to hire a person now might "just be saddling him" with someone he doesn't necessarily want.

Barring waiting until January 1, Fisher suggested at least waiting until Beevor joins the staff as a designate director.
