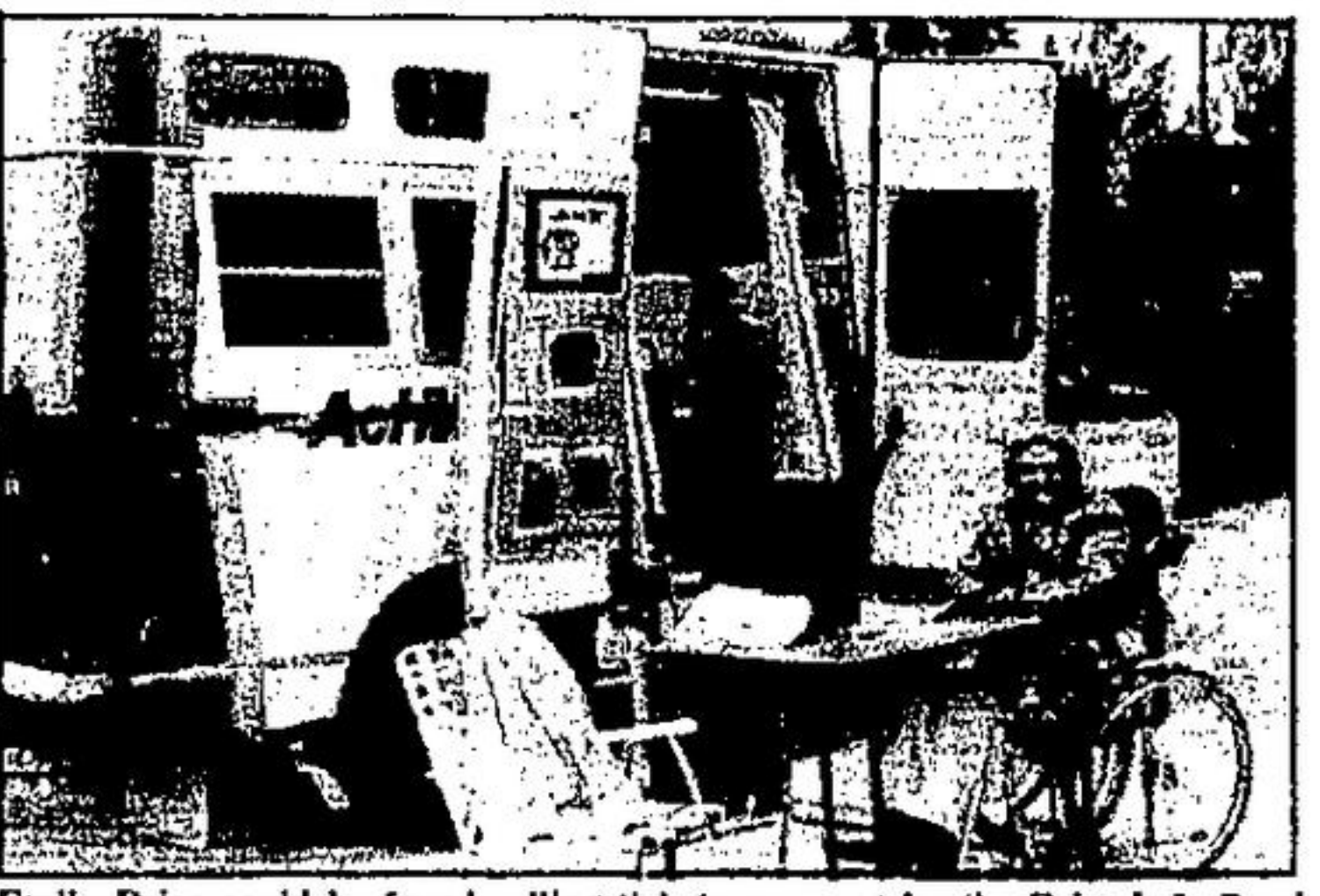
Doug McRae and Pauline Barlow were on hand at the Optimist booth constructing candy dishes made out of bottle caps. They also sold food at their booth.
