Armstrong alone in stand against interest rates

Councillor Mike Armstrong made it clear he wants the federal and provincial governments to take some action to reduce high interest rates to small business and farmers. He told Halton Hills council Monday night it's time to "get mad," and urged them to back a resolution from the Township of Minto calling for such action. Armstrong pointed out any business person with a quarter of a million in inventory must pay out about \$5,000 a month just to carry it. Mayor Pete Pomeroy said he would support some kind of a resolution to that effect if it came from Halton Hills council. Councillor Ross Knechtel said using the word "demand" in seeking action would accomplish nothing. He contended home owners with mortgages should be included in any resolution. "This matter is beyond our jurisdiction," he added. Councillor Harry Levy agreed, saying any reductions in rates should apply to everyone. He pointed out the cost of the reduction will only be passed on to all the taxpayers. Council voted to take no action but simply received and filed the Minto resolution.
