## Baines spends most to lose

Julian Reed may have won the ballot battle but he lagged considerably behind his main opponent in the provincial election last March, Fran Baines, when it came to spending money. The Commission on Election Contributions and Expenses released candidate spending figures

for all Ontario election ridings recently. In Halton-Burlington Reed hung on against a strong challenge from Tory Baines to win his third straight election. New Democrate Chris Cutler was a distant third in the election.

But, when it came to spending money Baines was way out in front. The statement she filed on campaign spending and contributions under the Election Finances Reform Act showed she spent \$32,537.31 compared to Reed's \$19,094.28. Cutler spent \$4,883.51.

Reed polled 13,395 votes, Baines 12,877 and Cutler 3,500.
