Canada Post Canada

It's been stretched for almost 3 years.

We can't stretch it any further.

You don't need reminding that almost everything costs a lot more now than it did almost 3 years ago — the time of the last postal increase.

But, can you imagine how much operating costs have risen for the postal system that serves the second largest country in the world?
