## Members concerned

First aid in the schools generated much discussion at the October meeting of the Nassagaweya Women's Institute. The subject of the meeting on October 14 hosted by Mrs. Sharon Anderson was prompted by a school bus accident outside the local school at Brookville on October 1.

Mrs. Fran Pearce initially was concerned as a mother and nurse to learn how the school was prepared for such emergencies. She wanted to know what first aid equipment was available and who was trained at the school to administer first aid. However, surprised at the lack of any set policies provincially or Regionally, as to first aid in the schools and at the fact that no teacher is required to receive this training, she decided to investigate further to present as convener of the meeting.

Those present were alarmed to learn that at recess, at industrial arts or when their child was balancing on the high beam in gym there may be no-one in the school with basic first aid training. Although a 16 hour course is offered to teachers, it is not mandatory. Jointly it was resolved that a request for mandatory first aid training for all teachers in Halton Region be sent to the Regional Public Health, Board of Education and Brookville School. It is hoped a similar request will be accepted by the Institute Area Convention later in October to be taken to the Provincial level of government.

It was also decided that further safety precautions would be requested for outside Brookville school in the form of flashing amber lights and school bus turning signs. The Institute will also purchase additional first aid supplies for the school as recommended by a qualified St. John Ambulance instructor.

Apart from such a serious topic, the ladies were in high spirits following their very successful first annual Homefest held the previous Saturday. Mrs. Liz Adamiak, the president, thanked everyone for all their efforts and time devoted to making it a memorable day.
