Cancer cured through diet and prayer—speaker

Acton Library was recently the setting for a most interesting public talk given by Mrs. Nora Henderson of Burlington, and sponsored by the Bahai's of Halton Hills.

Mrs. Henderson spoke of her battle with cancer—not just one, but three types; breast cancer, lymphoma, and leukemia, all diagnosed at the same time. Her doctors gave her from two months to two years at the most to live. When Mrs. Henderson, a long standing member of the Bahai' Faith, spoke of her resolve to get better through diet and prayer, her doctor emphatically denied the possibility of recovery, and stated that her illness was definitely terminal.

Apparently, Mrs. Henderson does not give in easily, and this negative prognosis only served to increase her determination to overcome what could be for most people, overwhelming odds. Besides which, the Bahai' teachings emphasize the importance of nutrition and the powerful influence of prayer, giving Mrs. Henderson the extra support necessary in her struggle.

Mrs. Henderson is a biologist by profession, and has been involved with research in several areas. She immediately embarked on her search for a cure, starting with a diet that included mega doses of vitamins: Vitamin A taken in the form of carrot juice; Vitamin B as in Brewer's yeast; Vitamin C, herbal teas such as comfrey tea; 20 sweet almonds daily; ground apricot seeds, ground whole grains, millet, blackstrap molasses, fish, chicken, baked potatoes, salads served with cider vinegar or lemon, and foods high in potassium such as oranges, bananas, etc.

Some of the advice given in the Bahai' teachings, are as follows—avoid overeating; eat natural foods; exercise before, not after, meals; eat one type of food at a time; take liquids before solids; have a light breakfast; avoid harmful emotions such as anger, vengeance; avoid fatigue; fast in mild seasons, not in extremes.

Generally speaking it is a diet of moderation. Of course, alcohol and smoking are taboo.

During Mrs. Henderson's search for help with her illness, she visited three haematologists, or blood specialists, who kept track of her progress through blood tests. She came across several books on cancer, written by doctors at the same time. Her doctors gave her from two months to two years at the most to live. When Mrs. Henderson, a long standing member of the Bahai' Faith, spoke of her resolve to get better through diet and prayer, her doctor emphatically denied the possibility of recovery, and stated that her illness was definitely terminal.

One book, written by Max Gerson, M.D., and published in 1958, entitled "A Cancer Therapy...Results of Fifty Cases," was particularly helpful. Dr. Albert Schweitzer, who was cured of diabetes by Dr. Gerson, says of him, "Those whom he cured will now attest to the truth of his ideas... A medical genius who walked among us." Dr. Gerson also saved the life of Dr. Schweitzer's wife when she was dying of TB. Dr. Gerson's "secret", which he insists is no secret, consists of bringing the body back to its normal physiological equilibrium. This he accomplishes through diet, vitamins, and enzymes.

After some difficulty, Mrs. Henderson obtained the necessary enzymes, and took them, along with the vitamins, juice of carrots and green vegetables, and iodine. Each of these play a very specific and important role in human nutrition and metabolism. In particular, the enzymes had a profound effect, reducing the number of white blood cells to a normal level. Mrs. Henderson explained that enzymes digest the protein covering of the cell, allowing it to be absorbed by the phagocytes. Initially, Mrs. Henderson had to have her spleen removed, it was so greatly enlarged in its effort to dispose of the debris. At present, her haemoglobin is normal; the red blood cell count, a measure of bone marrow health, is normal; indeed, Mrs. Henderson looks and feels very fit. She is free of breast cancer; the lymphoma is no longer palpable; the leukemia is no longer in evidence.
