"Lest we forget"

Hundreds remember in Sunday service

Acton and Nassagaweya residents paid tribute to those who fell in war preserving our freedoms at annual Acton Legion organized Remembrance Day services Sunday.

Legion members, police, firefighters, Acton Citizens' Band, Boys' Brigade, members of the Scout and Guide organizations and politicians all marched from the Acton Post Office to the cenotaph in front of Trinity United Church where a short service was held. Hugh O'Rourke served as Parade Marshal and C

Company of the Lorne Scots were the honour guard.

Legion president Jimmy Higgins gave the Legion Charge and then governments, local service clubs and organizations, schools and youth groups, labor unions etc. placed wreaths in front of the cenotaph.

John McHugh read the names of the war dead followed by George Elliott's playing of the Last Post and Reveille while Billy Middleton and Bob Angell raised and lowered the flag to half-mast.

The parade then marched to Knox Presbyterian Church for the annual service. Legion officials Vic Patrick and Ed Footitt read scripture lessons as part of the service and there was a minute's silence, Prayer of Remembrance and O Canada was played.

At 3.30 p.m., following the Remembrance Dinner at Branch 197, there was a Remembrance Day service at Soldier's Memorial in Nassagaweya featuring the hymn O Valiant Hearts, invocation, prayers, The Lord's Prayer, placing of the wreaths, reading of the names of the war dead, playing of the Last Post and Reveille, the hymn Abide With Me, God Save the Queen and the Benediction.

Suggest handicap ramp for Murray Memorial Y

Murray Memorial YMCA program coordinator Eileen Dix would like to see a ramp at the Acton Y so handicapped people could participate in courses there.

Friday she attended the councillors' drop-in to discuss the problem of access to public buildings for the disabled.

She explained she set up a program for the handicapped this fall but found they couldn't attend because they can't get into the building. After meeting with the Friends-in-Deed handicapped group she discovered local disabled people have

great difficulty going into stores, doctors' offices and other places because there aren't ramps and are many stairs. Only the post office has a ramp, something which was built just the past summer.

Councillor Dave Whiting said there is no federal, provincial or municipal legislation requiring owners of buildings the public uses to install ramps for the handicapped.

Dix says she would like to see a ramp at the Y building as well as a meeting room and washrooms accessible to the handicapped. She'll investigate options which would make it possible for the handi-

capped to join in programs at the Y. She will also look at securing a 75 per cent grant to cover the cost of a handicapped access from the province.

She suggested more should be done around town to make it easier for the handicapped to shop and go to the doctor. Councillors noted new sidewalks built in town are being ramped for the handicapped. Dix plans to discuss the plight of the handicapped with region Medical Officer of

Health Dr. Peter Cole, citizen of the year, Ron McKnight, who is handicapped, Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson who heads up the municipality's Activan committee, Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed and local businessman Lorne Doberthien who has been urging the province and Ottawa to bring in legislation requiring special parking spaces for the handicapped at major attractions like the CNE and Ontario Place.
