Few claims for damage from water

If the claims sent to the region so far are any indication not many people had laundry damaged by brown-yellow water which flowed from Acton taps for a week recently.

Acton regional councillor Dave Whiting reported at Friday's drop-in that in the first week since regional staff came to town to announce a compensation program for damaged clothes, fish or anything else, only three claims have been received. These claims total \$210.

He said people maybe can't be bothered collecting from the region or re-washed their clothing and the stains came out.

People can still submit claims by sending them directly to the region or dropping off lists of damaged items and their cost at the town office. Anyone needing assistance filing or collecting on a claim should call Whiting.

Friday one woman came in to ask about the brown-yellow water problem because her two guinea pigs have become quite ill since drinking the water for three days.

Whiting noted the water was tested and found safe to drink for humans as well as pets like cats and dogs. The extra chlorine put in the Prospect Park well during the seven days it was turned on did kill fish though. He added high concentration of iron is the problem with the Prospect Park well and isn't built up in the human body.

The region has no idea if the brown-yellow water might make small animals like guinea pigs sick. The resident was told what chemicals were added to the water while the Prospect Park this information on to a well was operating and doctor treating the she was going to pass animals.

Notice of increase in penalty to be charged on arrears of taxes levied in 1981

The Town has recently been imposing a penalty for late payment of taxes levied in 1981 equal to 1.25% of the amount unpaid on the 1st day of default and on the 1st day of each calendar month thereafter. Effective December 1st, 1981 this penalty is being increased to 1.896%. A penalty of 1.896% of the amount of all taxes levied in 1981 and unpaid at December 1st, will be added to the unpaid balance on that date. You may avoid the increased penalties by paying any balance of taxes levied in 1981 prior to December 1st, 1981.

The rate of interest to be charged on tax arrears from previous years will also increase from 1.25% to 1.896% per month effective December 1st, 1981.

Interest Rates

HERE'S HOW TO SAVE BIG DOLLARS WHEN YOU BUY BIG ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES

LOOK FOR THE ENERGIGUIDE LABEL

When you buy a major electrical appliance, you're picking up two price tags. One is the cost of the appliance. The other is the cost of the electricity to operate it over its lifetime.

Until recently the energy price tag was missing. You paid now - but had little idea of what you would go on paying. Now there's a second tag, in the form of an Energiguide label.

WHAT IS ENERGIGUIDE?

Energiguide is an appliance labeling program under which energy consumption "stickers" are attached to new refrigerators, freezers, dishwashers, clothes washers, and kitchen ranges offered for sale in Canada. The program was initiated by the Government of Canada and is operated in co-operation with consumer groups, appliance manufacturers and retailers, electrical utilities and provincial governments.

COMPARISON SHOPPING

The whole idea behind Energiguide is to help you, the consumer, to compare the energy cost tags of appliances and determine which is the best buy. Comparison shopping and wise decisions can save you a great deal of energy and money over the long run.

HOW DOES ENERGIGUIDE WORK?

The label on each new appliance shows the number of kilowatt hours of electricity (kWh) consumed by that appliance in one month of normal operation. This rating is determined by a test developed by the Canadian Standards Association for all appliances labelled. The number is representative of the energy that the appliance will consume under normal operation in your home. It's not exact; the test could never duplicate precisely all the conditions in your home. But it is correct as a comparative rating, to indicate the difference between models.

To convert the Energiguide rating in kWh to dollars, multiply by the cost of a kWh in your area. (The current national average is 4¢ per kWh.) This will give you the operating cost for one month.

kWh per month x cents per kWh = cost per month.

WORK OUT THE LIFETIME COST

To really appreciate the importance of Energiguide ratings, figure out the lifetime energy cost of the appliance. The average major appliance lasts 15 years, or 180 months.

Multiply the cost per month by 180 and the number you get will be impressive. And it will be an underestimate, because it assumes a constant electricity price over 15 years.

TWO REFRIGERATOR EXAMPLES

Consumer and Corporate Affairs Canada publishes each year the Energiguide ratings for new appliances. From the 1981 Refrigerator listing come the following examples:

Type and Defrost System	Total cu. ft.	kWh month
Model A - Two-door, top mounted freezer, frost free	18.2	117
Model B - Two-door, top mounted freezer, frost free	17.1	190

Over a 15-year lifetime Model A, although slightly larger, would cost you \$842.40 for energy (at a constant 4¢/kWh). Model B's energy cost would be \$1,368.00. That's a difference of \$525.60!

WHEN MORE IS LESS

The appliance with the lower Energiguide ratings may cost a little more to buy - they usually have more insulation, better motors, more sophisticated controls. But as the above example shows, the value of the energy they save over their life cycle will pay for the extra investment many times over.

So when you're shopping for major appliances look at both tags, do a little figuring and buy the model that will be cheapest over its life cycle - not just the cheapest on its purchase price.

AN ENERGIGUIDE BONUS FOR ALL

Besides providing consumers with information for comparison shopping, the Energiguide program is having another effect. Appliance manufacturers are improving the energy efficiency of their models. Already there have been some notable improvements and experts predict that within a few years major appliances will be consuming about 40% less electricity - while providing the same services. That's a powerful example of how consumer power and industrial innovation go hand in hand.
