St. Joseph's CWL

Hear about St. Martin's Manor programs for unwed mothers

St. Joseph's CWL monthly meeting was held on November 10. President Mary Margaret Dickinson gave a report on the Fall Regionals held on October 31 in Mt. Forest. Routine reports were given by the secretary, treasurer and convener. Plans for our Christmas Bazaar, November 28, at the Acton Legion, are in

their final stages. Our Christmas dinner will be held on December 9 in the parish hall and will be catered once again by the Dublin Women's Institute.

Following the business meeting, 35 League members and invited guests listened to a moving, as well as informative, presentation by Sister Joanne, Director of St. Martin's Manor in Hamilton. "Babies having babies" was the theme of her talk and slide presentation. Most of the Manor's support over the past 28 years has come from CWL's and Holy Name Societies.

Sister Joanne said that 1,000 teenage girls a week across Canada get pregnant and one-third are terminated by abortion. St. Martin's offers a viable alternative. Catholic as well as non-Catholic girls are welcomed at St. Martin's and only 12 are in residence at one time. This limited number enables St. Martin's to provide a home-like, supportive, and personalized atmosphere for the girls. The age range is anywhere from 12 to 29 years.

Sister Joanne outlined the programs available at St. Martin's. They include an educational program on a one-to-one basis; a life skill program which focuses on menu and meal planning, as well as compiling grocery lists; a medical program that ties in closely with St. Joseph's

Hospital and the St. Elizabeth visiting nurses. Prenatal information, biological data and proper, well-balanced meals are stressed. A social and recreational program is also available to the girls which includes bowling and swimming year round. These facilities are provided by "charitable friends" of St. Martin's.

Group and individual counselling are available not only to the girls themselves, but to the hurt parents and father of the unborn child, if he desires.

Sister Joanne said Thanksgiving, Halloween and birthdays are occasions used to create an atmosphere of celebration because the girls have made the right decision to have the baby rather than choosing abortion.

She said this is an emotional and upsetting time for the girls and even at their young age they have to make the most important decision of their lives whether to keep their babies or give them up for adoption. They are given the pros and cons of both sides. Close labs are kept on the girls even when they leave St. Martin's and on-going help and support is available to them. The girls often form

strong attachments to the staff members and return for visits. Lifelong friendships are often made with the other girls as well. A thank you to Sister

Joanne was made on the CWL's behalf by Mrs. Mary Whelan who presented her with a donation. A light lunch and refreshments were served.

NDP spokesperson defends boards



"Marketing Boards don't rip off consumers" according to NDP spokeswoman Marion Chambers, of Erin Village. Mrs. Chambers described the Marketing Boards as a "rational attempt by food producers to stabilize our prices, and their incomes."

Mrs. Chambers was responding to two recent reports, one from the Economic Council of Canada, and the other from the food industry. Both reports were

critical of marketing boards, and the idea of supply management. Mrs. Chambers was especially critical of the food processor's study. She called it a "blatant, clumsy attempt to shift the blame for high food prices to the Marketing Boards, and the farmers themselves."

The food processor's study said that the marketing boards have overcharged consumers an average of Seventeen Dollars a month, but Mrs. Chambers claimed

that was only "half the story."

"There's no doubt that a so-called free market would temporarily bring down food prices," she said, "but the drop would only be temporary."

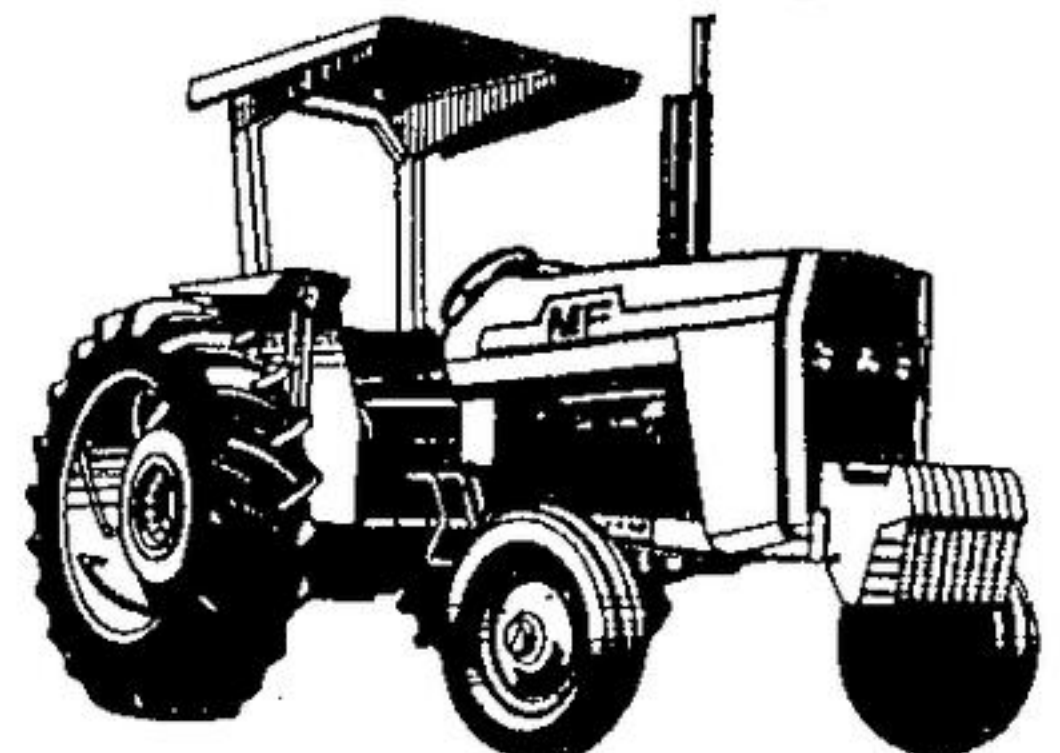
