Remembrance Day was observed with a minute's silence. Birthday congratulations were sung to Joe Fuller and Mrs. Marguerite Ingils.

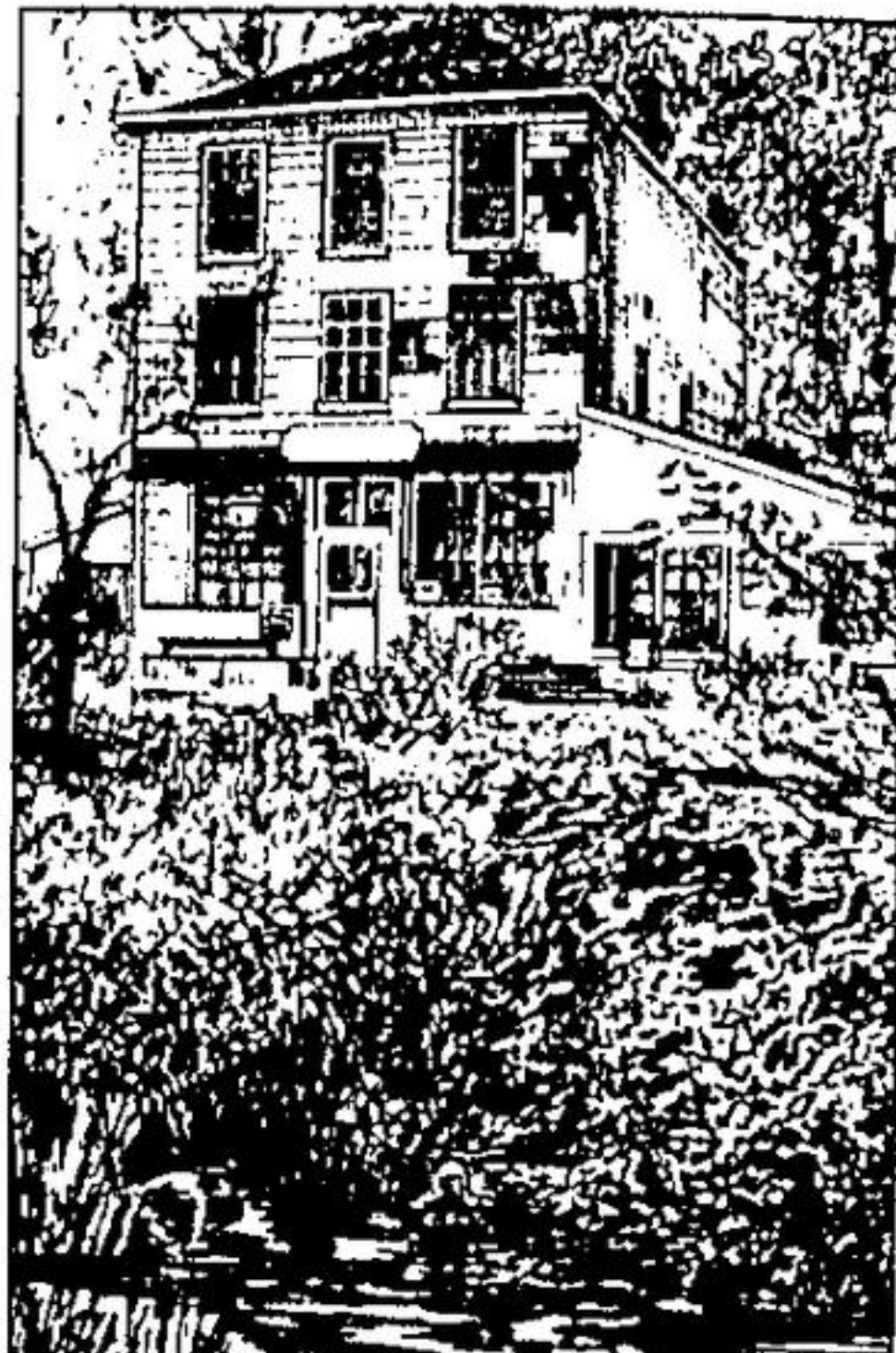

Step back in time at Eden Mills tea garden

Eden Mills General Store is a familiar landmark to the growing number of visitors who flock to the village, particularly on weekends. The tall, grey, stone building on the hill, dominating the main street, was built by Scottish stone masons in 1871. It is only one of ten similar architectural styles remaining in Ontario. Built as a General Store for Adam Argo, feed and hay were originally stored on the second floor.

Today, it is the setting for the "Country Garden Tea Room" the latest venture of the owners, Sharyn and Dave Banks. Little did they dream, when visiting relatives in the Village two years ago, they would achieve long-awaited goals of owning an old stone house and their own business.

First project was to restore the interior of the general store to its original layout. An adjoining building was then renovated to house the antique store. A collection of Canadian pine furniture and collectables are open daily for browsing.

This past spring a small tea-bar was added, offering a variety of specialty teas, coffee and fresh-baked muffins and pie. When a Toronto Star Writer rhapsodized about their apple-cheddar muffins, hundreds of people arrived one weekend to sample them. Depending on the season, fresh cranberry or raspberry muffins are offered.

Most of the restoration work has been done by Dave, a technical representative with an oil company, "helped" by two-year-old son, Mark.

The success of the antiques and tea bar led to the opening of the Country Garden Tea Room, a full-fledged tea room. The menu offers a
