Downtown plan prohibits plaza east side of town

Landown Shopping Centres is concerned the new plan for redevelopment of downtown Acton will prevent the firm from building a plaza on the east side of Acton.

Landown's lawyer, J. Goldenberg, went to Halton Hills council Monday to object to two parts of the Acton Core Area Policy Study which was unveiled at the end of October.

The study had only come to the attention of Goldenberg and his client, Jerry Sprackman, recently and they "basically support" the document and encourage redevelopment.

Councillors were told Landown feared the core area study would have an "unintentional impact" on their plaza proposal. Goldenberg observed the Landown plan has been revised several times over the last few years and still hasn't been settled. The plaza proposal has shrunk from a 90,000 square foot development to just 43,000 square foot, but still features a 24,000 square foot Zehrs supermarket. Landown's latest proposal, from last spring, was referred to the planning department pending the completion of the Acton urban boundary (water and sewer system capacity) study.

Goldberg complained the downtown study might "pre-empt" the urban boundary study. The down-

town study suggests Acton has all the major food store requirements it needs, Goldenberg said, but Landown's experience has been downtowns don't have the space to satisfy all food store needs.

The BIA plan also appears to "prohibit" location of a supermarket outside the downtown area and Goldenberg maintained the downtown area doesn't have the space for a large food store.

The modern concept of downtown redevelopment, supported by the Ontario Municipal Board, Goldenberg said, is that core areas should be compact and pedestrian oriented. This concept doesn't accommodate supermarkets because they need low land costs and lots of space for a large store and parking. He pointed to other towns, like Uxbridge and Alliston, where plazas on the edge of town have helped downtowns prosper because they keep more dollars in town.

Consultant for the downtown study, Peter Walker, observed the plan is aimed at preventing a plaza or supermarket outside the downtown because there is no market for a supermarket outside the core area. Downtown is well used by local shoppers and with a new IGA plaza planned there will be even less reason for commercial development outside the BIA.
