Sabres aim high, after six points

This is an important week for Acton Sabres. After last Wednesday's 10-4 loss to Burlington Cougars, Sabres sit in seventh spot in the Junior B standings, just one position above the last playoff berth.

Captain Jules Russiani noted his club has games in hand over several clubs and wants to make the most of those contests by earning points and moving up in the standings.

This is a good week to make a move. Two of Sabres' three contests are against the weaker clubs, but the coach says they'll be going all out to collect six points.

Tonight (Wednesday) Acton plays Milton at home, which should be a game good for two points if Sabres play anywhere near their potential.

Then on Saturday they travel to Burlington for a return match with the Cougars and Russiani is counting on his club to avenge last week's loss.

Sunday night's contest with cross-town rivals Georgetown Gemini in Georgetown should be good for two more points.

Russiani feels four points this week are crucial, six would be even better, because Sabres must move up to "secure" a berth in post-season play.

Against Burlington, Sabres tried to play the same type of game they turned in the previous Friday against another top club, Streetsville.

Acton's game plan centred around containment, especially of Cougars big line. Russiani doesn't usually employ a line matching system, but against Burlington's top trio he sent out Denis Kirton, Rob Vermeulen and Donny Goudreaux.

It wasn't that line that let the Sabres down either, the roof caved in when Burlington's other trios started scoring.

Sabres trailed 3-1 at the end of the first stanza but had fallen behind 7-2 after two frames. Russiani felt the containment strategy worked for a 1-0 and a half.

Dave McGilloway fired a goal for Sabres at 7:35 of the first period with Mark Duval and Mike Monihan assisting.

Denis Charbonneau counted Sabres' second period score, Monihan assisted. The goal came at 8:04.

At 7:53 of the third period McGilloway scored his second goal of the night with help from Monihan and Monihan rounded out Sabres' scoring at 9:24 of the third frame. Duval and McGilloway assisted.

It was a busy night for Sabres' netminders Les Williams and Chris Martin. Williams faced 15 shots in the first period and one in the second before he was pulled less than a minute into the middle stanza and replaced by Martin. Cougars peppered Martin with 34 shots.

Sabres launched 29 drives on the Burlington goal. McGilloway was best performing well with the Central Junior B west division all-stars at the Miracle Mart tournament in Kitchener, Russiani reports.

The west division squad advanced to the gold championship contest, played last night (Tuesday) and that's an indication of just how tough the Central Junior B loop is, Acton's coach says. All Junior B circuits in Ontario have all-star teams in the tournament.

McGilloway has been employed as a utility player, Russiani notes, one game playing right wing with a couple of Burlington stars, and in another contest centering a pair of Oakville wings. "He's been playing all over and performing really well."

His coach said he has scored one or two goals in each of the three tourney contests his squad has played.

Looking at the team Russiani is convinced at least one other Sabre, Duval, should have been named to the all-star unit. He notes Duval has had some bad nights, but anyone who has logged the ice time Duval has is bound to have an off night.
