Thinking Day pennies help Guiding

Joining thousands of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts around the world, Brownies, Guides, Pathfinders, Rangers and Cadets in Halton will be celebrating "Thinking Day" on Monday, February 22.

Chosen because the date marks the birthdays of the founder of Scouting and Guiding—the late Lord Baden-Powell and the late World Chief

Scout facts:

- There are 107,795 registered boy members in Ontario.
- There are 20,163 registered adult members in Ontario.
- There are 2,053 registered Groups in Ontario.
- There are 238,344 registered boy members in Canada.
- There are over 14,000,000 registered members in over 150 separate territories.
- Scouting is brought to the community through a sponsor, 1104 Groups in Ontario are sponsored by churches, the rest by service clubs, schools and various community associations.
- The Provincial Council for Ontario maintains on a year-round 100 acre Adult Training Centre at Blue Springs near Acton. Over 4,000 persons attended some functions at Blue Springs during the year.
- The adventure Base "Daymar" continues to be developed. This is a 150 acre campsite on the junction of the Blanche and Englehart rivers near Englehart. An excellent base for canoeing or exploring parts of Northern Ontario.
- Over 6,000 boys and leaders in Ontario attended the 5th Canadian Jamboree (CJ '81) held in Kananaskis Country Alberta, July 1-11th, 1981. A total of 17,000 boys and leaders participated in this event. The site is 35 miles east of Banff, in the foothills of the Rocky Mountains.
- Over 500 boys and leaders attended the 6th Ontario Venture held at the Albion Hill Conservation Area, September 26-28th, 1980. Some 500 members of Scouts Canada and the Girl Guides of Canada participated in a Ski Jamboree February 7-8, 1981, at C.F.B. Borden.

Guide Lady Baden-Powell, Thinking Day is the occasion for special ceremonies stressing the Guide ideal of international friendship. Girls the world over give "Thinking Day Pennies" which are used to promote Guiding.

Pennies collected by Halton Division companies and packs are gathered together in the "Canadian World Friendship Fund." They will be used to help send trainers to establish Guide programs in new countries, aid Guide organizations in times of disaster, assist the work of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts and help defray the costs of delegates to International Events.

Part of the Canadian World Friendship Fund is turned over to Guiding's four World Centres—in Switzerland, Mexico, England and India. Canadian Guides visit these centres for adventure in international friendship.

The Girl Guides program was started in Canada in 1910, and since then has contributed in a positive way to the lives of many young girls. The training the young people receive assists in preparing them for responsible and self-reliant adulthood and for co-operation and concern for others.

The Girl Guides of Canada is a member of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts and thus is a part of a large international sisterhood which promotes friendship and understanding among the peoples of many nations, colours and creeds.

Acton doctors support walkout

Acton doctors will be supporting tomorrow's (Thursday) walkout of Ontario physicians.

Dr. David Van Der Bent will be the only Acton doctor keeping regular hours as doctors across the province engage in a one-day "study session" to protest OHIP billings.

Members of the Ontario Medical Association (OMA) charge 30 per cent higher rates than OHIP pays, resulting in an additional billing to patients.

OMA members want the OHIP rates to be equal.

Although Acton doctors do not charge over the OHIP fee schedule, Drs. Sam Ng, and Peter Wong of Glen Lea Clinic have not made appointments for Thursday. At Acton Medical Centre, Dr. George McWilliams is on vacation and Dr. Brian Moore gets Thursday afternoons off regularly.

Dr. Van Der Bent is available for any emergencies.

land and concentrated on bringing the pain back to the ocean where it had originated.

Not surprisingly to Ron, the ritual failed to work. But the good doctor didn't give up. He went through the entire process again. Ron was astounded as he watched the swelling go down and the pain go away. The witch doctor returned to the ocean and thanked it for healing Ron and apologized for Ron's ignorance in entering a terrain which wasn't his.

Even though he was in a remote part of the Philippines, Ron said he never had trouble obtaining cigarettes, Pepsi, or Coke. There was even the controversial Nestlé's Formula Milk. But he missed real milk. Even while in Manitoba, he didn't have his good old cow's juice because his foster family did not drink it.

Ron could not get over the Philippines version of

democratic government. He said it was not uncommon to see soldiers in the streets with guns. He learned President Ferdinand Marcos and his political party hire people to serve as the opposition party.

Now that he is back home, his future is undecided. He has been offered a job teaching English in Billerica, but at a salary of \$12 a week doesn't think the job would give him the opportunity to visit home very often. However, he would like to see more of Asia and Indochina.

But right now, he is busy just adjusting to the culture shock of coming home—to the cold weather and the materialism and comfort Canadians take for granted.

"But at the same time, coming home is good," he says. "It is great not having to ask what food I am eating."
