Program aid nips crime in the bud

People who have not been victims of crime should be calling the police and praising them for the protection provided by a new program.

This won't likely occur, but crime victims may berate the force because an officer has not promptly responded to take down the sad details.

The new program, called "proactive", instituted Aug. 24, 1981, has been especially effective in nipping crime in the bud, said Insp. John Barrett, district commander of Halton Regional Police.

"Proactive" means prevention, as opposed to "reactive" policing, which refers to response after the crime, he said.

Currently, four officers, one from each shift, form this unit.

This cuts down on the number of officers available to respond to a complaint, but as "proactive" gets the upper hand, there should be fewer crime complaints to respond to, said the inspector.

"In the past, we have been too busy chasing criminals to get to the crime before or as it was happening," he said.

The new unit is experimental and Insp. Barrett admits that "reactive" strength is being sacrificed.

BIA stand

The Town of Halton Hills endorsed the concept of the downtown studies and the improvements proposed by both Business Improvement Areas in a motion Monday night.

The Town has applied on behalf of the BIA's for provincial loans amounting to approximately \$300,000 for long-term downtown improvements. The loan will be paid back by the downtown businesses through a special levy.

Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson asked what kind of support the Town would be giving the BIAs.

Councillor John McDonald replied, "Not monetary support, but first the acknowledgement of the downtown study, and that council accepts the concept. We have to take into consideration that a quarter of a million dollars is being raised by private industry including both areas."

McDonald described it as a unique situation when private industry contributes to municipally owned land.

Emergency procedures

How do Halton's emergency organizations get along when business really gets hot?

That's a question Regional officials are going to be looking at following a decision by councillors last week to confirm their support for "comprehensive emergency planning" at local and Regional levels.

While supporting the need for planning, members both at council and the administration and finance committee were leery about the need to spend more money on the plans.

The need for emergency planning, highlighted by the 1979 Mississauga train derailment, has been of concern to councillors since the Emergency Measures Organization was disbanded following a decision by the Provincial government to withdraw financial support.

Police chase

A high-speed chase involving three men in a stolen Cadillac ended in Burlington late Monday night.

The Cadillac was reported stolen in Brampton earlier in the evening, and according to Halton Police reports, was sighted at Fourth Line, Milton by two Halton police officers. The police pursued the car at high speeds for 28 kilometres. The chase ended in Burlington when the driver lost control of the car and the vehicle went over an embankment.

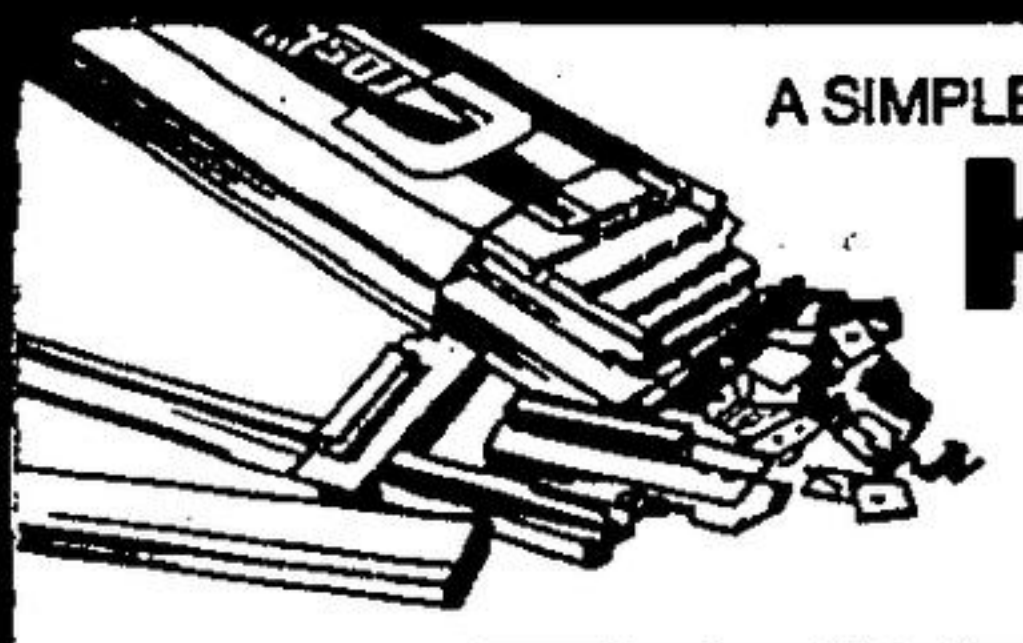

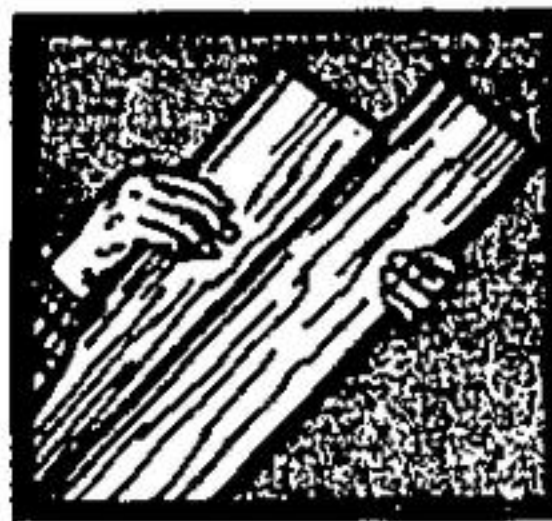
Halton Board of Education trustee for Acton, Arlene Bruce was recently elected chairman of the library committee.
