Smaller quantities of hashish also seized

Hashish or cannable resin in quantities ranging from one gram to a pound were selzed by police who arrested and charged 23 of 30 suspects in a series of drug busts recently across the region.

Last week this paper reported "Hashish was purchased in lots of eight grams to almost one pound to total two pounds." This was correct. However, in checking further with the RCMP, this paper learned quantities

lower than eight grams were also allegedly sold to the undercover officers, including an amount as small as a gram.

Four Acton men were arrested and charged with trafficking in marijuana or cannabis resin and were among the 30 individuals charged with various drug offenses. Police seized about \$50,000 worth of drugs in the 30 cases combined
