Town charges all teams for lights

Fees for use of ball and soccer fields won't be increased for minor sports Halton Hills general committee decided Monday night.

For three hours councillors heard arguments against user pay fees from representatives of Acton and Georgetown leagues as well as Limehouse, and then thrashed out the issue.

In the end only part of recreation director Tom Shepard's second proposal, which was made after a storm of protest following unveiling from sports groups earlier this month over his initial plan, was adopted by council.

Shepard suggested each minor sports or children's soccer and ball team pay \$10 for use of fields this summer and adult teams should pay \$20. In addition he wanted to see all teams that play under the lights pay \$6 a game.

Councillors decided not to raise minor sports fees from last year's \$5 a team. However, they went along with Shepard's call for adult teams to pay \$20 as well as \$6 a game charge for lights.

The motion also confirmed council's support of the user pay philosophy for recreation facilities, including ball diamonds and soccer fields.

Another motion called for close monitoring of maintenance costs this summer and then consultation with groups this fall on maintenance performed, as well as costs. Shepard was directed to come to the 1983 council with an outline of 1982 costs for fields and diamonds as well as projections of 1983 costs. In addition the recreation director was told to bring a report showing how high fees must be in 1983 for the town to recover 10, 15, 20 and 25 per cent of its costs. This plan was proposed by Councillor George Maltby, while this year's fee schedule was suggested by Mayor Peter Pomeroy.

Bruce MacPherson, speaking for the Acton industrial ball league, asked how the town came up with a figure of \$6 for lights. He noted new lights are budgeted for this year, which will cost less to operate.

He asked why the league was paying a fee and then couldn't get little maintenance problems, like an uncovered manhole cover in the outfield, long grass cut and an overhanging screen, solved. He noted they weren't asking for a domed stadium to keep the mosquitoes away in summer, just some simple maintenance.

Richard Vanderwal, of the Acton Soccer Club, said he objected to fees when they were brought in two years ago and still does.

Two years ago they were told fees wouldn't increase in the future and talk for lining fields would be supplied, Vanderwal declared. Now the town wants to raise fees, without any improvements or renovations to fields except at M.Z. Bennett near the end of last season. To make matters worse talk won't be supplied now either.

He questioned the town's right to charge for fields at school grounds it doesn't own. Pomeroy noted the town has an agreement with the boards of education for sharing facilities has an agreement with the boards of education for sharing facilities which amounts to renting, so he presumed Halton Hills could legally charge fees.

Vanderwal also questioned maintenance spending on Acton soccer fields compared to spending on Georgetown facilities.

The recreation department books should be checked, he said, noting talk bins were bought but nobody in Acton has ever seen them. He urged the municipality get its own house in order before asking for more fees.

Fields should be maintained out of tax dollars and user pay shouldn't apply to children's sports, Vanderwal told the councillors. He warned minor sports keeps kids off the streets and benefit the entire community. Halton Hills should be encouraging minor sports not discouraging them, he concluded.

If the town had opted for Shepard's original proposal Acton Minor Ball would have been forced not to operate, Dunn said, because fees would have increased from \$100 last year to \$1,800 for this season. The new proposal was "satisfactory" because they could afford it, but Dunn noted fees will still go up 100 per cent for something other town's don't charge for.
