Gravel roads trecherous

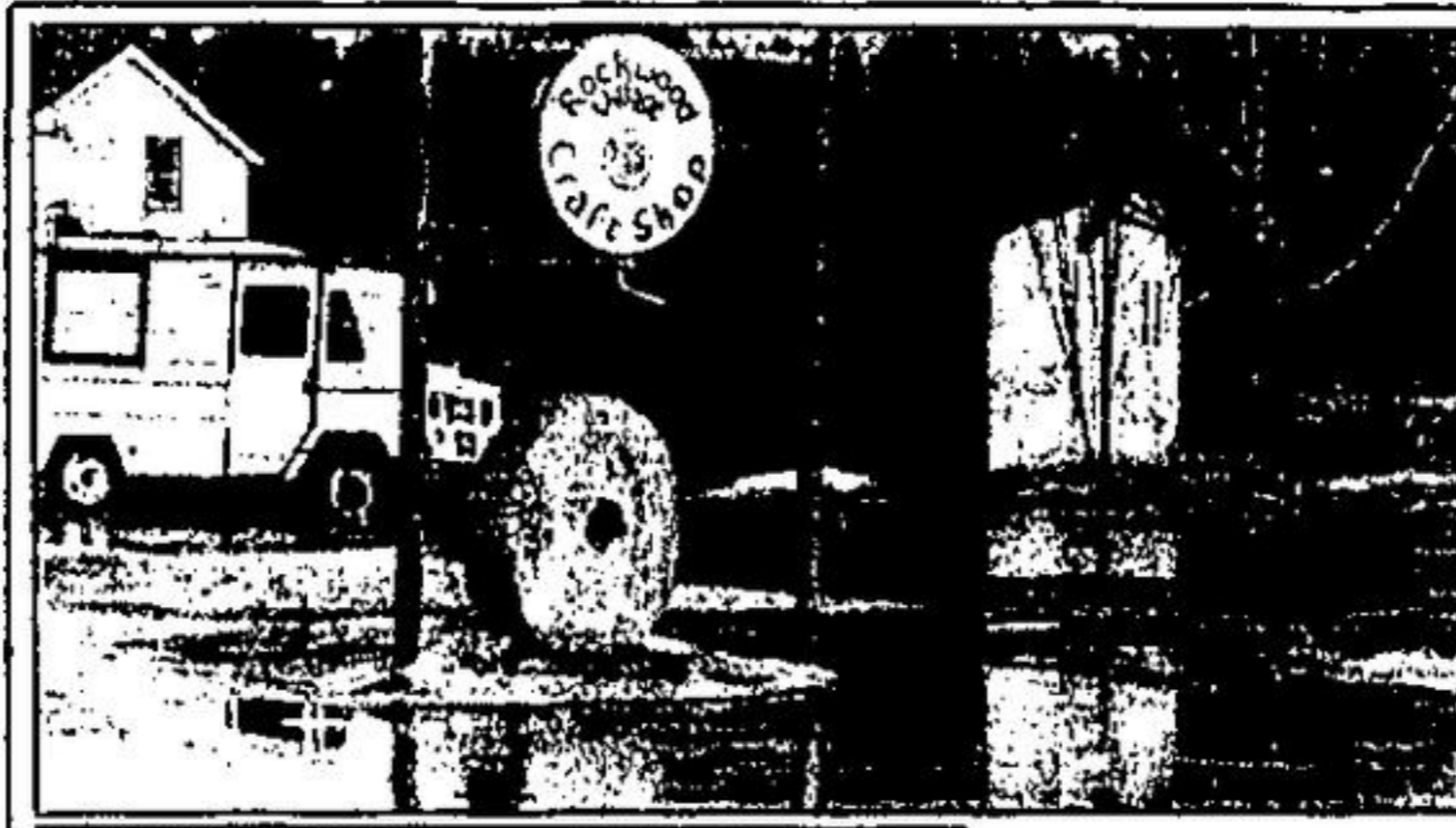
