Obituary

Father A.J. Olinsky

The village of Rockwood was saddened last week to learn of the death of Father Allister J. Olinsky, Pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Rockwood and St. Peter's in O-atic.

Rev. Olinsky, of 14 Gzowski St., died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph on April 4 following a lengthy illness. He was 61-years-old.

Born at Maryhill, he was the son of the late Frank and Bertha Olinsky. On June 1, 1957, he was ordained into the priesthood at Cathedral of Christ the King in Hamilton. Since then he has served at St. Anne's at Riversdale; Sacred Heart in Paris, Ontario; St. Joseph's and St. John's in Kitchener; Church of Our Lady in Guelph; St. Andrew's in Oakville; and St. Patrick's in Guelph. He came to Rockwood eight years ago.

Rev. Olinsky was instrumental in the re-opening and renovating of St. Peter's, and set his sights on a separate school and hall for Rockwood. He never saw his dream, but his

congregation will strive to see that his wishes are eventually met.

Besides his unrelenting dedication to the community, Rev. Olinsky was an antique collector.

Rev. Olinsky rested at Albert MacIntyre and Son Funeral Home, Guelph. Vespers and the Rosary were recited at the Church of Our Lady, and his body lay in state there until April 7, when a Mass of the Resurrection was celebrated.

Interment was at St. Joseph's Cemetery, Brantford.

Rev. Olinsky is survived by his sister, Rose (Mrs. C. Wilson) of Hamilton; brothers Joseph and Albert of Stoney Creek and Ivan of Grimsby. He is also survived by Mrs. Marie Furness and Leonard of Fort Lauderdale, Florida; Sister Eleanor, SSND, of Oakville; Mabel (Mrs. William Hilker) of Elmira and Loretta (Mrs. R. Donald) of Kitchener.

ONTARIO FARM ASSISTANCE PROGRAM EXPANDED

You may now be eligible.

We've broadened the eligibility for the 1982 Farm Adjustment Assistance Program so we can help more farmers.

For farmers facing financial difficulties, the program offers financial assistance and financial management counselling.

BROADENED ELIGIBILITY
The farmer must have equity in the farm business of between 10% and a new upper limit of not more than 60%. Present interest and principal payments must exceed 20% of operating costs.
The total value of food or tobacco products produced on the farm in 1981 has been reduced to \$12,000.

ASSISTANCE
Farmers can take advantage of one, or more, of the following options:
1. Deferral of interest by the lender on loan(s) for a period of six months backed by a Provincial guarantee. During this time, the lender will not compound the interest.
2. An interest reduction grant on floating-rate loans and short term, fixed-rate loans for operating purposes only for up to 12 months. The maximum grant will be 5 percentage points. Loans may be reduced to a level as low as 12%.
3. An additional line of credit for operating purposes only, guaranteed by the Province of Ontario. This new credit would be provided by the lender at the prime rate for up to 12 months.
