Speyside residents may call either the Acton or Milton fire department, but service will be quicker

from Acton. When a problem is brought to Fire Chief Mick Holmes he takes immediate action, Councillor Pam Sheldon told Halton Hills council recently. She said less than a week after she told him residents of the Speyside area didn't know which fire department to call since they were halfway between Milton and Acton, the fire chief personally visited the resid-

Sheldon explained Holmes and the Milton fire chief drove the area from each fire hall, checking the response time, mileage and number of homes.

Finding the response time was faster from Acton. the two chiefs decided to rearrange the fire area boundaries. Now the Acton boundary extends south down to Ten Sideroad to the Fourth Line and 15 Sideroad to the Town Line and down the Town Line.

Holmes wrote letters to each of the 74 residents in the Speyside area and visited them. The letters delivered to each home explained while they could still call either fire department, the Acton fire hall is closer. Included was a phone sticker with the fire department phone number and a larger one to stick up on the wall for use by babysitters.

Councillor Sheldon said she was most impressed with Holmes' actions and commented, "It was just super and gave such a personal touch, that the residents were reassured." She added, "I just wanted to thank the chief and let everyone know what he did."




