Farm Survivalists twin with Drayton to help with today's situations

A local chapter of the Canadian Farmers Survival Azsociation has been formed, to attempt to help farmers with the terrible economic stress and strain they are experiencing.

Keith Black, local chairman, told the Free Press, the South Wellington group of the CFSA is an offshoot of the Drayton area chapter. The two groups are actually twinned and will hold joint meetings, as well as individual gatherings. Bill Hilton of Acton, Keith Black, Roy Petty, George Major and Clarence Hilton of RR4 Rockwood and Byron Bruce, Ospringe are local members.

Black says farmers find themselves in the predictament of increasing their debt load hoping the next year will get better, but their situation only gets worse.

He admits some farmers are very comfortable,

but many young ones, or those who have expanded, just cannot handle the interest rates and other factors farmers are faced with.

Black cites the absense of a beef marketing board as being one of the disadvantages of their field. He explained farmers do not know how much their beef

will fetch at market. With four or five per cent of the population being farmers, and another 40 to 45 per cent of jobs in Canada being related to agriculture, Black continues, agriculture is one of the main catalysts of the entire economy. People are concerned about the automobile industry and with good reason, but they should be concerned about the farming industrv."

Black said banks have been going in and closing up farmers. His association is saying wait until we

have a chance to negotiate. Banks he said, have now realized they should negotiate.

Assistance programs from the Ontario government are a step in the right direction, Black noted, but there's a lot of red tape.

The government is attempting to help farmers, Black said, but more aid is needed. The Farm Credit Corporation just released another \$500 million for loans at 16% per cent across Canada for the farmer. But even at that interest rate, it is still too high for the average farmer. Black says government officials say they will subsidize farmers, but according to Black, the farmers don't want to be subsidized. they just want to do their job.

The South Wellington chapter of the CFSA is authorized by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture,

Black says, and will help out anyone who needs it. But they are interested in membership. Between their newly formed group and the twinned group in Drayton they have about 75 members, he said.

The group is always looking for people interested in lobbying provincial and federal governments.

Jim Schroder, MP for Guelph riding attended the organization meeting of the South Wellington chapter last Tuesday, and MPP Jack Johnson has attended previous meetings. This shows the group these politicians are aware of and interested in their

"We are looking for solutions for long term agric-

ultural policies in Canada," Black said. However, in the meantime, interim policies must be set out.

CFSA help consists of financial and legal consultants, organizing counties, provinces and eventually the country to stop the injustices, and fight for sensible interest rate policies before it is too late.

The goals of the organization are: to lower interest rates; to negotiate just and reasonable settlement between farmers and the banks; to provide legal and financial counselling services to farmers; and to work with and through organized farm groups towards a producer controlled marketing

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
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
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
