Eramosa buys school annex

by Barbara Funk The Wellington County Board of Education has accepted the offer of Eramosa Council to purchase the Rockwood school annex property situated between Guelph St. and Alma St., next to the Eramosa-Rockwood Medical Centre and the Rockwood-Eramosa Fire Hall. The school board will use the property until the end of June with the title to be transferred on or before August 3.

The property will then be used by the Eramosa Non-Profit Housing Corporation for the erection of a senior citizen's housing project. The province has approved a 26 unit apartment building with ancillary space for common room, laundry, caretaker, storage and mechanical rooms. The board of directors has approved a conceptual plan for pair of two storey wings joined by the present two school classrooms. Apartment sizes will be approximately 585 square feet for a one bedroom unit, and 730 square feet for a two bedroom unit.

The architects for the project are James C. Somfay and Associate of Fergus with Mrs. Katherine McIntyre of Toronto.

Anyone who is interested in occupancy will be able to pick-up preliminary applications at the Eramosa Municipal office on Highway 24 in the very near future.

The board of directors is hopeful that construction will begin this fall. The board of directors of the Corporation are: William Adsett, chairman; Mrs. Reta McPhedran, vicepresident; Larry McDougall, Mrs. Betty Marshall, and Barrie Dryden. George Day is secretary-treasurer.




