OHA must approve Sabres-Gem merger

While the Acton Sabres and Georgetown Gemins are exploring the possibility of a merger there's no guarantee the Ontario Hockey Association would allow the two clubs to become one team for Halton Hills.

In his five years with the OHA director Gary Wilson says he's never heard of two teams merging, but he added that doesn't mean it couldn't happen. Final decision on a merger would have to come from the OHA.

One thing that would have to be discussed by the OHA Board of Governors is drawing rights if they allowed a newly formed Halton Hills entry into the Central Ontario Junior 'B' Hockey League. It seems that the OHA doesn't recognize regional government and it would be like two towns forming one team. The OHA would have to design drawing boundaries from which their players could come. Although the boundaries of Halton Hills are already drawn and seem logical. it would have to be an OHA decision.

Another possible reason for not allowing Halton Hills to form one squad would be the rest of the Central loop. According to Wilson the remainder of the league would be asked for their opinions of a merger and solid objection from the other teams might prompt the board of directors to vote 'no'.

Despite the possibility that the OHA could say 'no' to a merger the two local teams have to

decide what they want. The OHA is the least of their problems at the moment.

Wilson stated that the OHA will sit down May 12 to review Junior 'B' entries and he has suggested that if the Sabres-Gems are planning to continue their merger talks for this season they make a presentation to that effect. Wilson added that if the OHA knew that a merger was being discussed they could probably wait until the beginning of July for the Gem-Sabres to solve their differences.

Gemini president Zeke McCandless and outgoing General Manager Bob Tost sat down a few weeks ago with Sabres outgoing GM Ron Jeffery to get the ball rolling on a possible merger. After four hours of initial talks little had been decided other than a decision to meet following elections of officers had been completed for both teams.

That's where things stand today. How do people feel about the possible trans-

action? The Gemini, who instigated the merger, voted at their general meeting last week to continue to persue such a merger, McCandless is hoping that it could possibly be completed before the season while Tost said it's a step in the right direction." He felt however, that it wouldn't or couldn't become effective until next year.

Acton Sabre coach Jules Russiani is a major booster of the joint project from the Sabre standpoint feeling that it is the only way to go. He feels that it must happen this year.

"There's not enough to work with," commented Russiani about the talent in Acton or Georgetown alone, "neither team has anything to look forward to. Make the play-offs and go out in the first round."

Russiani, like many people involved, can see many advantages to the one team. "With what's coming back from both teams you would be competitive," commented the Sabre mentor, "and combined resources can help financially."

Jules feels that one of the main disadvantages is that each centre would lose its personal identity. Gem GM Bob Tost expressed the same views both for and against but added that the disadvantage wasn't really one. "It's more ego than anything," commented Tost.

Russiani hadn't talked to his team's president Frank Allsop and said that he would have to respect their decision. "But from a bench standpoint why would you want to stop it," added the coach, "a winning team is always the goal."

One of Allsop's main concerns was the local boys. "It was our aim to provide hockey for local youngsters," commented the Sabre president. Last season the Swordsmen had 10 AMHA grads in their line-up. Allsop noted that he would want to get together with Sabre management from the past before making a decision on a merger with Georgetown.
