

Education Needs Task Force is postponed until January

A Needs Task Force will not be considered by the Halton Board of Education until January. A bid by Halton Hills' trustees Arlene Bruce and Betty Fisher to establish the task force effective September, 1982 was tabled until the new board is inaugurated.

The task force would comprise taxpayers, members of the business community, students, trustees and educators from each municipality of the region. It would examine the educational process so that taxpayers are able to clearly identify educational needs of the Board of Education.

In a report to the board, Bruce and Fisher explained the Task Force would be parallel in some

ways to the Special Education Advisory Committee now formed and would centre upon educational needs other than special education.

The Task Force would examine the board's goals; examine the needs of the board as established in the long-term plan; examine issues that have been referred to the Task Force by the Halton Board or by public and private groups; maintain awareness of provincial developments regarding provisions of educational services; assist in planning information systems for parents and taxpayers; and report to the board in an interim report by November of this year with a final report by January 1983 at which time the committee would disband.

At the board meeting, Fisher explained this would

not be a committee which would add to the board's costs, instead she said it would be made up of volunteers with the only expense being the rental of the room wherever meetings are held.

"We have in the past few months been deluged with concerns from business community and taxpayers," she told the other trustees. A task force would help the communication system.

The Needs Task Force would help in making certain decisions, Fisher said, but it will not have the power to dictate.

Mary Bullock, trustee for Burlington, wondered if the Task Force would be disrupted because of the November 8 municipal election. She suggested it be tabled for six months.

Esquing representative Betty Walker wanted to know how the task force would be structured, what kind of controls would be on it and how would it be determined who would sit on it. She said she did not want to see it turn into a bitch session, and was concerned about the costs involved.

Fisher explained the costs would be minimal. As far as it turning into a bitch session, she continued, a meeting is only as good as the leadership. If a good person was heading the task force, it would not turn out like that.

Volunteers could be asked to step forward, or they could be handpicked from the communities, Fisher said.

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\$5,000 damage Hornby Box fire

A fire at Hornby Box and Pallet on Main St., N., Friday at 8:53 p.m. resulted in \$5,000 damages according to deputy fire chief Bob Hyde.

The fire was contained to the hammer mill, used for breaking down scrap pieces of wood into sawdust for resale. Hyde says the mill took up a piece of tramp iron (a nail or other piece of metal) which in the hammering process got red hot. He figures the machine was shut down while the iron was still hot, and smouldered in the sawdust before actually breaking out in flames.

The damage, Hyde says, was mainly electrical, and there was smoke throughout the building, making the fire look worse than it really was.
