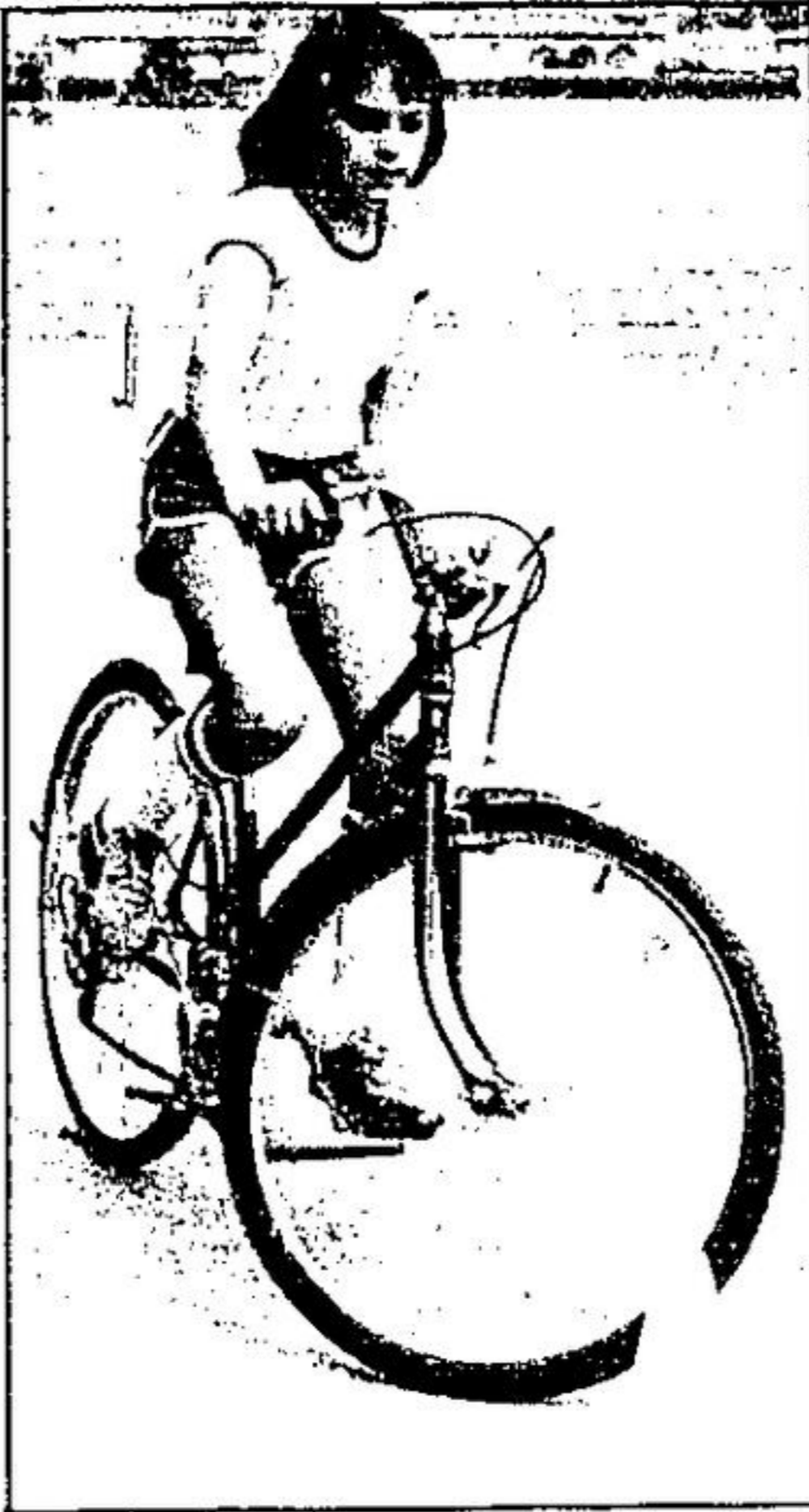

Don't light model rocket engines

Halton Regional Police are urging children to contact them immediately if they come across objects which look like firecrackers, but are really model rocket engines.

Staff Sergeant Les Graham said 60 flying model rocket engines were recently stolen in a break and enter at a store in Milton.

Police fear the burglars will have thrown the rocket engines away somewhere in the region and children will find them and mistake them for firecrackers.

These rocket engines are about two inches in length and between 3/4 and an inch in diameter and covered by brown cardboard. Inside there is a black powder similar to gun powder.

Graham says if a child lights a rocket engine thinking it is a firecracker it would be "disastrous" since they will explode if lit. These rocket engines will propel a model rocket over 1,500 feet in the air.
