



The library is planning a Surprise Special on August 11 with Mousetrap scheduled for August 18.


The finale for those special Wednesday features will be August 25 when the topic will be Food, Glorious Food. Advance registration is required for Wednesday fun.

Fridays will be an equally fun day at the library. The Mad Scientist Club will run July 9, 16, 23 and 30 at 2 p.m. for children age 9 and up.


In August children age 9 and up are invited to go to the library on Fridays for the United Nations Club and learn about the world. Meetings will be held
