Fourth Line reconstruction financing set with town loan

Halton Hills will kick in \$250,000 for the reconstruction of the Fourth Line north of 22 Sideroad and be paid back by the owners of a gravel pit on the

road with interest. After months of negotiations the town has struck a deal which will see the money paid back with interest with J.C. Duff and Bott Construction giving unconditional guarantees and the town will have a charge against the land. The municipality had wanted an irrevocable letter of credit and a repayment date of June 30, 1985, but those provisions were lost during negoiations, clerk- administrator Ken Richardson reported Monday at general com-

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months.

Originally the owners of the gravel pits and province were to share totally in the cost of the reconstruction of the road but now the province will put in about \$5,000, the pit company, which has a number for a name, \$250,000 and the town \$250,000.

If wayside pit permits are issued so gravel can be taken out for provincial highway construction the town will receive a total of five cents a ton in payment against the \$250,000 loan.

Committee approved the deal and Richardson said this means the project can start fairly soon.
