Teens find work with gov't program

Four Acton teenagers are employed in various jobs this summer thanks to the Experience '82 program.

Sponsored by the Ontario Youth Secretariat, Experience '82 offers 105 individual programs in 26 participating ministries of the Ontario government, often in co-operation with community organizations. The programs have been designed to complement the academic and career interests of young people. At the same time, young people are helping to provide valuable community services.

Julie Pierce is working for the Ministry of Natural Resources at Kelso Conservation Area in Milton. She is one of 30 young people learning the daily work routine of the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

Julie is handling a variety of tasks, working at everything from cutting grass to supervising the mini-put area.

Julie has just completed her first year at Lakehead University, Thunder Bay, in the Forestry program.

Gord McArthur and Brent Vickery secured a \$1,500 loan through the Student Venture Capital Project and started up G & B Entrepreneurs. The money was used toward transport-

ation, equipment and insurance for their business which entails chimney sweeping, wallpaper hanging, house painting or selling TV antennas. Within a few weeks of starting their business they had to hire three more people to help out. Both are recent graduates of Acton High School and are planning to attend university in the fall.

Through Experience '82, the Acton BIA has hired Don McDonald Jr. to help keep downtown Acton clean for the summer months. He is an Acton High School student.

A fifth student, Kelly White, has also been hired by the BIA to work with Don, but she will also be assisting with downtown promotion and advertising.

BIA chairman Ed Wood explained his organization had originally applied for two students under the government run program, but were too late in their application and were only allowed one. Kelly is being paid with BIA funds. She just completed grade 12.

Other Experience '82 programs include working on farms, working in the Crown Attorney's office, working as summer school teachers, and doing public relations for the Bruce Trail, and the Niagara Escarpment Commission.

Ontario budget costs Halton Hills \$35,000

Increased OHIP premiums and Ontario Sales Tax changes announced recently in the May Provincial budget will cost Halton Hills approximately \$35,000, this year, Treasurer Ray King says.

Of this, the impact of sales tax changes alone would amount to \$30,000 this year, with increased OHIP premiums amounting to an estimated \$4,400.

Building materials for municipally-owned buildings, previously exempt from provincial sales tax, will now be taxed. Street cleaning equipment, also previously exempt from sales tax to municipalities, is no longer exempt under the new budget announced by Ontario Treasurer Frank Miller, May 13.

Provincial tax refunds on asphalt and ready-mix concrete have been discontinued, and items such as trees, shrubs and plants for landscaping parks and municipal property are also taxed under the new budget.

In addition, the town is now paying tax on labor charges for the installation, repair and maintenance of personal property.

OHIP premiums rose from \$23 to \$27 per single person and from \$46 to \$54 per family.

King estimates the sales tax items alone would cost the town about \$35,000 over a 12-month period. From mid-May to the end of 1982, the remainder of the current budget year, sales tax changes will cost the town about \$30,000, King's report presented to General Committee of Halton Hills Council recently, noted.

The report also stated that although the additional costs put a strain on all parts of the town's 1982 budget, a considerable amount can be offset by two capital works tenders which recently came in well-under budget, saving the town \$32,000.

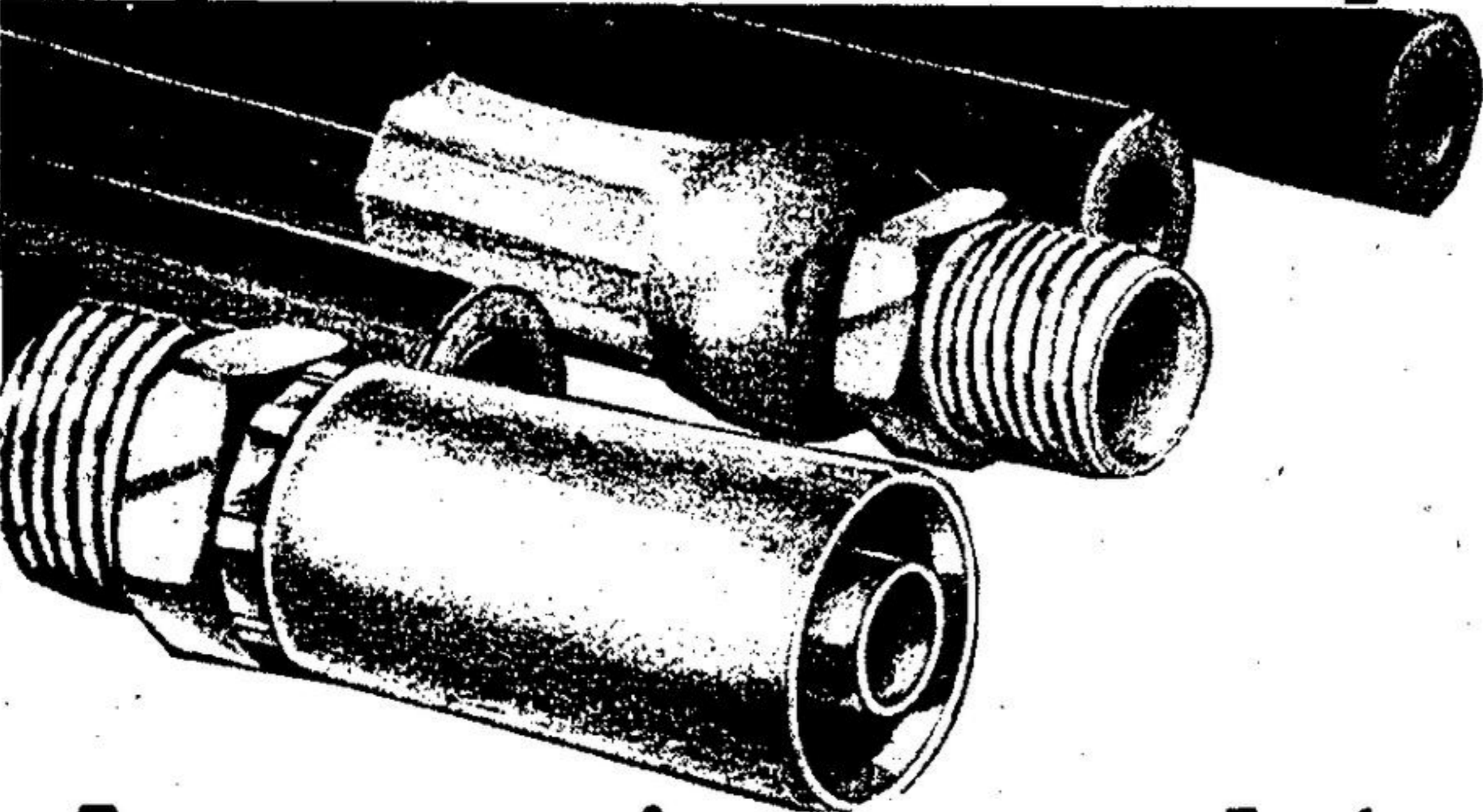
Tot Lot moved
