friends Fred Kiy, Acton and Glenn Willchuk, Mississauga were ushers.

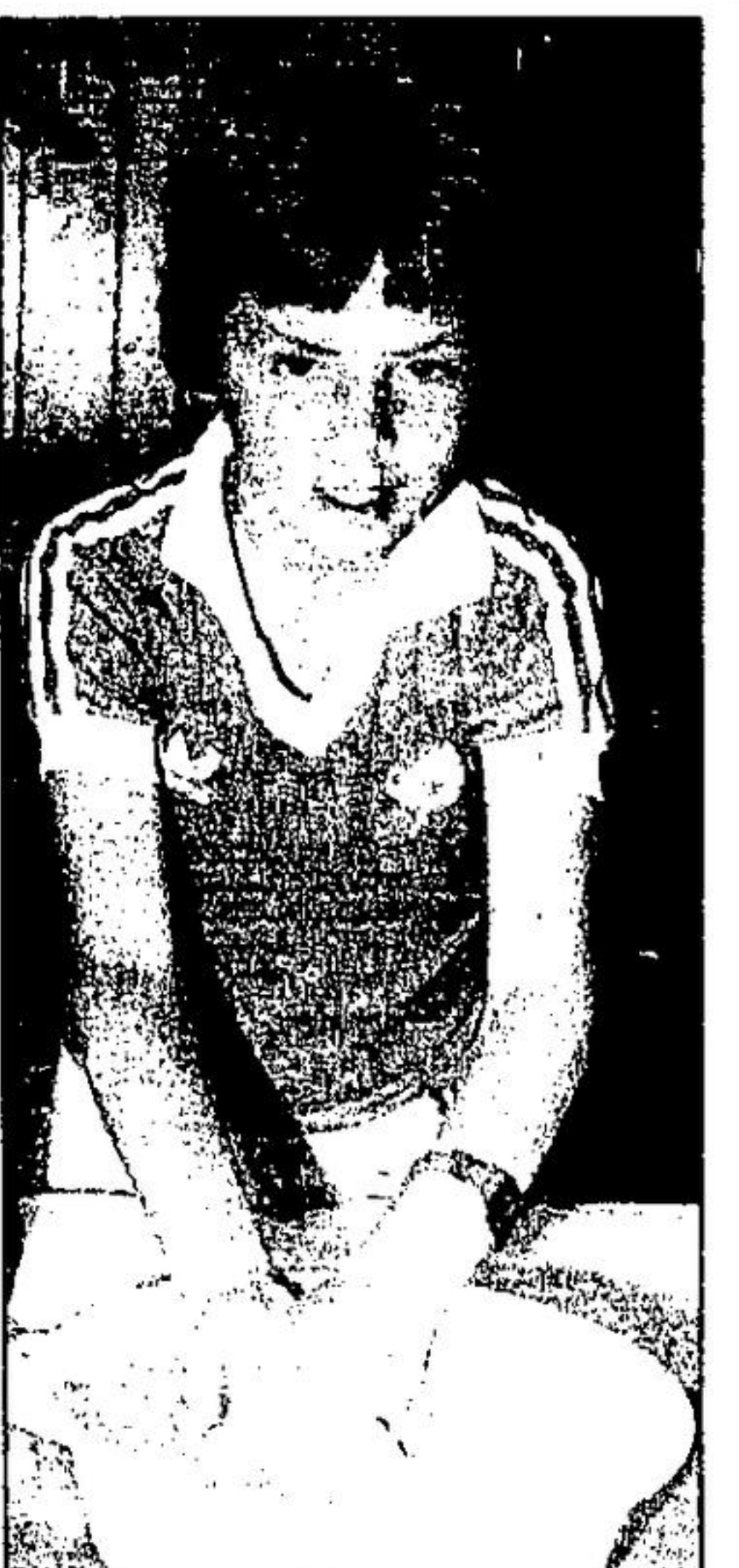
