Bert Leslie Halladay

Funeral service was held July 8 for Bert Leslie Halladay, 281 Metcalfe St., Guelph, who died suddenly in Guelph Hospital July 5. He was 43 years old.

Mr. Halladay was born on December 3, 1939 in Wingham, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Halladay. He attended Acton schools before marrying Faye McEachern in Acton on January 24, 1964.

Mr. Halladay was employed at Oak's Precast and was a people's warden and member of St. David and St. Patrick Church in Guelph.

Left to mourn his loss are his wife Faye, children Bruce, Bryan and Dawn, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Halladay, Fergus; his grandmother Mrs. Catherine Moore, Toronto; a brother, Willy of Acton; and sisters Doris McGilloway, Joyce Auger and Judy Denny, all of Acton.

National competition

Free Press earns 71.5 of possible 100 marks

The Acton Free Press earned a total of 71.5 marks out of a possible 100 in seven judging categories to capture the Best All Round award in the Canadian Community Newspaper Association's (CCNA) general excellence competition.

News Editor Helen Murray was in Saskatoon last week at the annual CCNA convention to accept the Best All Round award for class three broadsheets, as well as an award for The Free Press having the second best front page in the same competition class.

Judging was based on two mandatory issue submissions for the competition, both issues were from 1981. Class three broadsheet drew 15 entries from five provinces.

The nearest rival for the Best All Round award to the Free Press was the Listowel Banner with a total of 70.

The Free Press earned a mark of 10.5 out of 15 for its front pages. The Listowel Banner won with 12.

The Free Press editorial pages received a mark of 11 out of 20, good for fifth place while news of the community was judged second best with a mark of eight out of 10. Local features picked up a mark of 6.5 out of 10 for The Free Press, which was third in this judging category.

The Free Press was judged tops in three categories. This newspaper earned a mark of 9.5 out of 10 for its pictures and 12 out of 15 for typography. Free Press advertising was also given the highest mark, 14 out of 15.
