Rural residents complain about trap shooting noise district

For several hours most Sundays, Leonid Osso and his R.R. 1 Acton neighbors on Halton Rd. 12 are treated to the shouted word "pull" followed by the thunderous roar of a gun.

Now, following a complaint lodged with Milton council, town staff are going to investigate whether or not the noisy neighbor, the CRSQ Trap Club, is meeting all the requirements of local zoning bylaws.

Osso and his neighbors complained the weekly shoots have been infringing on their lifestyles for several years now and they're sick and tired of it.

"The main problem is the noise," Osso said after a recent council meeting. "The unpredictability of it is the worst part. You can't even call friends over on the weekend because you never know when they're going to be shooting."

In addition to looking at the zoning compliance of trap clubs in Milton's rural areas, council also approved motions to have staff look at the feasibility of a no discharge of firearms law for the Town and of minimum space requirements for such clubs.

"We need some standards so that some guy on a half acre in Omagh or Mofatt can't open up a trap shoot tomorrow without us having some authority to close him down," said Milton Ward 1 Councillor Rick Day.

Osso said complaints from the neighbors about the club were first made about six years ago, "but it was not done in unison, it was done individually."

The club is in an area with 30 high priced homes within earshot of its range, Osso added.
