An angling trip to Great Bear Lake in the land of the midnight sun is a dream for most

However, it was a dream come true for a couple of local sportsmen, Doug Mason of Acton and son Wayne of Halton Hills who have just returned from a week of fabulous fishing and sightseeing in this fabulous frontier of Canada.

Along with battling large Lake Trout, they made a side trip to the Copper Mine River where Doug Mason landed an Artic Char at 151/2 pounds, a very respectable catch. It will make a great trophy.

No prettier fish can be found than the Arctic Char with its bright colors which nature endowed this species with.

Wayne Mason landed the largest fish with a 211/2 pound Lake Trout plus a near record 31/2 pound Grayling.

The trip to Great Bear and home again by air posed some problems. On the way out at Yellowknife all fishing rods disappeared, I can just imagine the blue air around that air carrier. On the way home all trophy fish became misplaced and did not arrive with the fishermen. This in itself is a great catastrophy as fish are needed on these returns trips to verify the stories, tall or otherwise. However, the airline rectified this situation, delivering the fish by special delivery.

Salmon action on Lake Ontario has become very good with reports of records catches by many local fishermen. John Foley and his son Darren of Halton Hills boated 21 Salmon in approximately six hours of fishing. They released them, with the exception of two 10 pound fish.

Charters for Salmon fishing have become very popular. Tackle and rigs for this type of angling have become standardized with a jargon all their own.

Acton has its own charter boat with Gary Foster of Roseford Terrace, Gary has boated a good many Salmon already this season just to get in practice for the Great Salmon Hunt.

On the local scene, Fairy Lake in Acton is producing some nice bass. Bob Parsons of Acton landed a 41/2 pound bass, plus a whopping big 30 pound carp. That's no small achievement in a small restricted lake. Bring us a picture next time Bob, it will save you some ribbing in the future. Many people don't believe Fairy Lake holds such large fish.
