Lorne Scots take part in manoeuvres at Petawawa

Militia troops from several parts of Southern Ontario including Georgetown are heading north slowly, for nine days of intensive combat training. The soldiers, involving about 300 personnel from five different units in Hamilton Militia District, will be gathering at Canadian Forces Base Petawawa, north of Ottawa, for their annual summer concentration, from August 21 to September 2.

There'll be long, weary days of infantry training over that time. Activities involve something new this year, through-12 Grizzlies, the new General Purpose Armoured Vehicles (AVGP's) now being issued to the Militia.

The new vehicle will greatly contribute to the realism and effectiveness of this year's training," says Colonel Frank Ching, Commander of Hamilton Militia District.

The soldiers will also be putting into action the basic infantry skills taught during unit training the rest of the year, including patrolling, night attacks, map-reading, using radios, and the thousand-and-one other skills an infantry soldier needs today. Training will involve groups as small as 11-man sections and as large as 100-man companies, leading up to a large-scale three-day exercise in the field involving all available armoured vehicles and troops, winding up the camp.

Units included in the gruelling nine-day concentration are the Lorne Scots of Georgetown, Brampton and Oakville, the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry, the Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada, and the 23 Medical Company, all of Hamilton; and the Lincoln and Welland Regiment of St.

Catharines and Niagara Falls.

Other Hamilton Militia District Units won't be sitting idle in the meantime. Hamilton's 23 Service Battalion will be at

Canadian Forces Base Borden, north of Toronto, while the 11th Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery, of Guelph and Hamilton, will be in Grayling, Michigan, with their guns for live firing.

Antique planes flying again

The Red Baron will be airborne again on Aug. 29... at least, a replica of the Red Baron's famous Fokker Dr-1 tri-plane from the First World War.

That and several other antique aircraft will be flying when the Ontario Aviation Historical Society holds its Antique Aircraft Fly-in this Sunday at Brampton Airport's Great War Flying Museum.

Several antique aircraft will be on display in the Billy Bishop

Hangar at the Airport, for close inspection. Later on, all the aircraft, including a replica of Billy Bishop's SE5A, will be airborne in a special fly-past event. There's also a Fokker D-VII, bi-plane, and several others which will fly in from across the province specially for the event.

The museum opens just before lunch, and there will be hot dogs and sweet corn for the public. Admission will be charged.

Speed device claims untrue

The Marketing Practices Branch of Consumer and Corporate Affairs Canada recently concluded the prosecutions under the misleading advertising provisions of the Combines Investigation Act against Perfection Automotive Products (Windsor) Limited, The Hudson's Bay Company and Consumers Distributing Company Limited.

The companies made representations to the public in connection with the Perfection Speed Control device. It was claimed the device would maintain selected highway speed and assure adherence to posted speed limits.

The device was tested by the Motor Vehicle Traffic Safety Branch of Transport Canada which found the claims were untrue. During the tests they also found the device occasionally caused the throttle to stick and this could pose a danger to the public. They also expressed the opinion if the device is used to warm up a car with a catalytic muffler system, damage to the system could result.

Any members of the public who have installed this device on their car should have it removed and have their car checked for compliance with safety regulations by a qualified mechanic, Consumer and Corporate Affairs suggests.
