Ballinafad plan is premature

Halton Region is supporting Halton Hills in a bid to limit strip development in Ballinafad on the north side of Region Rd. 42, in Erin Township.

An amendment to the Guelph and Suburban Planning Area has redesignated a site north of the town line and just east of the Ballinafad community to allow for eight new residential lots along the road. The bid, according to Halton Region's planning department, would promote strip development along the north side of the road while the south side remains rural in Halton Region's official plan. According to the report, the land on the south side of the road is considered good (Class Two) agricultural land.

Last week the region's Planning and Public Works Committee approved a suggestion from planning staff calling the change "premature." At the moment, Ballinafad Area, which borders Halton Region and Wellington County, is designated a rural cluster.
