Ontario's fall anglers are fast developing that itch that only rainbow trout can scratch. And fall is here, what with the first frost already on the pumpkins and my tomatoes looking the worse for wear.

This should be one of the earliest fall runs on record. There are unseasonably high water levels and all the signs of an early winter.

Reports are in of run of Pink and Humpback Salmon running out of Lake Superior north of the Long Sault. These are usually the forerunners of most fall run fish including Rainbows, Cohoe and Chinook Salmon.

These Pink Salmon are easy to catch, they take roe very well and are quite susceptible to spinners such as Olympic, Mepps, etc., fished with a very fast, erratic retriever.

Bradley Mainprize from Acton and his partner Fred Ford of Guelph have just returned from a fishing trip to Northern Quebec in the Finger Lakes area, via Chimo. They came back with some real tales and the fish as well.

Over 100 charr were landed and released on this trip, the largest tipping the scales at 16% pounds, plus a good many Speckled trout that averaged around 21/2 pounds.

Just taking this trip to the hinterland and seeing the different flora and fauna would be quite an experience. Bears, caribou and ptar-

migan were observed in abundance. Pickerell are taking well in the Bay of Quinte area. Local anglers Norm Chard and Bob Hanley brought home their limits recently with an average of three pounds each. These are the choice eating of all Ontario's
