

Nuclear referendum question set

The nuclear referendum question to be placed on the November 8 municipal election ballot will be "are you in favor of supporting the goal of global nuclear disarmament and directing your government to support this goal to the extent of their powers."

Halton Hills council approved the wording after hearing a brief presentation from Janet Dural of the Yes vote committee.

Council followed her suggestion that the wording of the question be changed slightly from "general disarmament" to "global nuclear disarmament."

Mrs. Dural told council their group has been working to build public awareness about the nuclear disarmament issue but many people are concerned about the west disarming without the Soviets doing the same. She said Yes vote

supporters aren't seeking disarmament on one side, but global disarmament. She added the key word in the referendum was nuclear, not all disarmament, just nuclear.

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should receive a one time only regional grant of \$5,000 to cover renovations costs for the new office as well as increased operating costs. The increased operating costs could then be reflected in the 1983 operating budget for the centre and the region's grant next year.

Whiting feels the centre should be saved because "it's the only one of its kind in Halton. It costs much less to fund it than for the region to pay for all the services which operate out of the one office. It's the most cost efficient regional operation there is and I know Oakville and Burlington councillors who think the same way."

Under normal circumstances there'd be no problem for the region to quickly and easily authorize the supplementary grant. But, Whiting notes, the federal and provincial governments have cut their spending for social services leaving the region "holding the bag" for paying for services which weren't budgeted.

Renovations for the new office were covered from the operating budget and ran about \$4,000, despite the fact some work was done by staff and volunteers.

There's been about another \$1,000 in operating costs since May at the new location which weren't incurred at the Y building.

At the same time moving was "something we simply had to do," Mrs. Balkind stressed "we felt we had to come out in the open so people could see us and this much better location also provides better accommodations for the agencies."

There has been a dramatic upturn in the business for the centre as a result of the move. They also now have a bright and cheerful reception area, two permanent offices and three adjustable offices which afford more privacy. Mrs. Balkind says while their budget runs from January to December each year, the annual region grant doesn't come until April.

Mrs. Balkind says the region has been "sympathetic" about the problem and "see the value" of the centre.

Letters are being sent to groups which have donated money to the Centre in the past, but Mrs. Balkind isn't too optimistic since donations are down this year. Sunday at the fall fair the winning Teachers' team in the Challenge of the Acton Stars competition donated its \$100 prize to the Centre.

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Jon Hurst said they are asking all participants and sponsors to get the money turned in as soon as possible. Pledge money may be taken to any bank in Acton and a receipt will be issued if requested.

Art Tribe \$221.50; Ron Heller and Jon Hurst \$228.50; Craig Tatton \$284.50. In addition Acton Meadows donated \$187 and Dave Whiting and John Allinson represented the Chamber of Commerce and donated \$100. Most community groups participated and more details about large amounts raised by groups or individuals will be published next week when organizers have had a chance to review the pledge sheets further.

Household Hints

To repair dented Ping Pong balls, drop them in boiling water for a few seconds and watch the dents disappear.

Frozen food will defrost more quickly when it's placed on a cake cooling rack so air can circulate around it.

You can bleach and clean your stained wooden cutting board by rubbing it thoroughly with the inside of a lemon rind.

To remove dust and dirt from behind refrigerators, stoves, and washing machines, use a yardstick with a sponge or cloth attached with a rubber band.

Get rust stains out of white fabrics by rubbing with lemon juice and salt, bleaching in sun for several hours, then washing in sudsy water.

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Crossing guards for St. Joseph's School

There will be adult crossing guards at Cobblehill Rd. and Mill St. West and Ictoria St. and Mill St. West for children going to the new St. Joseph's School.

Monday night Halton Hills council approved a number of parking and traffic measures to improve safety for children going to the new school. Halton Regional Police safety officer Rod Beaumont and deputy engineer Ted Ballinger made a number of recommendations. In addition principal Fred Springer asked for an adult crossing guard at Mill St. West and Cobblehill Rd.

Seek 3-way stop at Cobblehill-Mill

Halton Hills is going to look into the need for a three-way stop sign at the Cobblehill Rd. and Mill St. West intersection.

Monday night, while council was discussing parking and traffic regulation changes in the area of the new St. Joseph's School, Councillor Terry Grubbe said she had received a petition signed by about 70 residents in the neighborhood who want a three-way stop. She called for a report from the engineer.

Councillor Dave Whiting asked if the report could be back to councillors by next Monday. He noted he drives through the area and the angle the two roads meet is bad and drivers can't see properly.

Deputy-engineer Ted Ballinger noted the three-way stop request at Mill and Cobblehill wasn't new, back-ground work was done in 1978 when there was another request which was rejected, so there would be no problem producing a new report for next week.

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
