

Bateman drawing prize

Only 2,000 tickets have been printed in a lottery for an original Robert Bateman drawing of Crawford Lake. Proceeds from the draw will go to the Crawford Lake Indian Village and Conservation Centre fund raising project.

Bateman agreed to do the pencil drawing, at the request of William Dodd, the owner of the Scrimshaw & Co. art gallery in Oakville—one of the first galleries in Halton to handle Bateman's paintings. The drawing is valued at about \$4,000.

The draw for the picture is part of a fund raising event for the Crawford Lake project which will be held Sunday, October 3 at the gallery, in Oakville. Tickets to the event are \$25.00 per couple, and will include admission to an art exhibition, a lecture by Bateman, and a wine and cheese reception. All ticket holders will be eligible for the draw on the original drawing.

Tickets are available from the Scrimshaw gallery, the Halton Region Conservation Authority office in Milton, at Crawford Lake, and from members of the Halton Region Conservation Foundation. Bateman has been familiar with Crawford Lake, located in the woods of the Niagara Escarpment near Guelph Line and Steeles Avenue, since he hiked and camped in the area in the late 1950s when he began teaching in Burlington. He now lives in rural Burlington just a few miles from the secluded lake, but has never drawn or painted it before.

Bateman and his wife Birgit, head the Halton Region Conservation Foundation's education committee, which is co-ordinating events to be held in Halton schools in conjunction with the three-year fund raising project.

Crawford Lake is unique. Formed as glaciers melted about 15,000 years ago, the

lake is so deep compared to the surface area that the water only partially circulates from top to bottom. This meromictic system produces a bottom layer of water that is always colder and more dense than descending surface water—so the distinct layers of sediment on the bottom have never been disturbed. Scientists can date

material found in the sediment simply by counting down the number of layers from the top.

Research at the lake led to the discovery of the most accurately dated prehistoric Indian village in all of Canada. Reconstruction of this Iroquois Village on its original site will begin this fall.
