## Rockwood Board wants changes to school boundaries

Parents of Grade eight students are being asked to attend a public information meeting at Rockwood Centennial School on Thursday anytime between 4.30 p.m. and 8.30 p.m.

The Wellington County Board of Education proposes to change the secondary school border lines. All Eramosa children south of Highway 24 will be affected, by the change. Those who are now or expect to attend Centennial C.V.I. will attend John F. Ross C.V.I.

Are children who are already at Centennial expected to transfer? When will this transfer take place? Will families with children already at Centennial and another about to start secondary school be allowed to have their children remain at Centennial or will they all go to Ross? These are questions to which we need answers.

This is an important meeting for grade eight parents, so do try to drop in at the school on Thursday.

Rockwood Centennial School is holding their annual "Open House" tonight (Wednesday) from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. This is the time for parents to meet with the teachers and discuss any questions they might have concerning their child's curriculum.
