Council asked Allow auctions Sunday

Halton Hills is considering allowing auctions on Sundays.
 Last week General Committee deferred making a decision on a proposed amendment to the bylaw which licenses and regulates auctioneers to allow for public comment at the October 12 council meeting.
 Auctioneer Jim Forbes sent the Town a petition containing 230 names calling for Sunday auctions.
 Councillor Ross Knechtel observed half the names on the petition weren't Halton Hills residents and he felt council should publicize the proposed change before passing the bylaw. He added council was only hearing one side of the issue and some people might want to object to Sunday auctions.
 The new bylaw would allow auctions on Sundays, but not before noon. Sales would be "conducted at one municipal address and occur quarterly or four times in any calendar year" according to a staff report. Provincial legislation would allow auctions any Sunday as long as only antiques were sold, or if the place where the auction was being held was closed for business on the Saturday before the auction.
 Mayor Peter Pomroy observed the proposed changes don't go as far as Forbes would like.
 In a letter with his petition Forbes noted Milton doesn't impose restrictions on auctions like Halton Hills.

Councillors urged repair Sixth Line

The Sixth Line between 17 and 22 Sideroads is badly in need of repairs a citizen has informed Halton Hills' councillors.
 Cal McIntyre, R.R. 1 Acton, attended the Acton councillors' drop-in Friday afternoon to complain about the "deplorable" condition of the rural road.
 He urged the road either be patched very soon or be torn up and completely rebuilt. It is full of large potholes and causes damage to car tires.
 Councillor Russ Miller noted the engineering department is aware of the poor condition of the road, but there haven't been complaints from residents living on this part of the Sixth Line since the condition of the road keeps drivers from speeding.
 McIntyre said he was aware patching is expensive, "but there is really no excuse" for any road being in the condition of the Sixth Line.
 After checking with the engineering department Councillor Dave Whiting reported resurfacing of this portion of the Sixth Line isn't scheduled until 1984, but promised the matter will be raised at council because the road can't be left in its present condition. Miller agreed something must be done before winter.
 McIntyre also urged the region grade shoulders on the good roads like 25 Sideroad. He noted gravel shoulders which haven't been graded are breaking away the sides of pavement and will eventually ruin a good road.
 Whiting checked with the region and learned because of budget restraints shoulder grading has only been done on Trafalgar, Steels and Guelph Line roads this year.

Bid to change surcharge fails

Efforts by a Burlington councillor to change some of the most unpopular aspects of Halton Region's sewer surcharge system have failed.
 Burlington councillor Walter Mulkewich made several efforts at last week's Regional council meeting to have base charges eliminated, a move toward balancing revenue from residential and industrial customers and to transfer part of the cost of the sewage system back to the general tax rate.
 Mulkewich made his first effort when councillors were asked to continue giving commercial and industrial sewage customers a special rate that declines as more and more sewage is pumped
