Volunteer centre gets a new boss

A first anniversary celebration at the North Halton Volunteer Centre recently served a dual purpose.

Carol Clark of Acton was introduced as the new co-ordinator of the one-year-old facility, taking over temporarily from Maureen McCallum beginning in November. Mrs. Clark will fill the shoes of the regular co-ordinator until she returns from maternity leave next summer.

As a volunteer interviewer for the centre, Mrs. Clark admits she "already had a foot in the door," although there is still a fair bit to learn about her new duties. She has been involved with the volunteer centre when it was simply an idea of

the North Halton Social Planning Council, of which she is a member. When the concept of a facility to co-ordinate volunteers with the agencies which require their services was introduced, Mrs. Clark volunteered to be part of a steering committee with the aim of establishing the centre.

"I thought it was a great idea," she said. "So many people don't know where to go in the volunteer line," she suggests.

Since the formation of the North Halton Volunteer Centre last fall, Mrs. Clark has interviewed volunteers from Milton and Acton and expects her new position will increase that responsibility to include Georgetown as well.

There are 42 agencies located in North Halton registered with the centre, all requiring volunteers.

Every effort is made to place volunteers in a position that is not only suitable to them but that is local to them as well.

Enrolment declining

Elementary school enrolment is now at 26,844, a decrease of 592 students or 2.2 per cent from last year, Halton Board of Education trustees learned Thursday evening at their regular meeting. The enrolment is 117 below projected figures, with the decrease mainly in the eastern parts of the region.

There are 18,860 secondary school students, a decrease of 267 pupils, or 3.5 per

cent from last year. This was 325 more than expected, with the increase coming mainly in grades 12 and 13, according to Ron Warren, assistant superintendent of Business Services. Overall enrolment, including 134 trainable mentally handicapped students, has decreased 2.7 per cent from 1981 enrolment figures, but it up 205 more than expected. Enrolments have

showed a steady decline since 1969 in elementary schools with 32,228 in 1969 compared to 26,844 in 1982. Secondary schools have showed a steady increase in students until 1981. In 1980, total high school enrolment was 20,123, in 1981 it started at 19,539 and in 1982 at 18,860. Enrolment for Trainable Mentally Handicapped has remained steady with 103 in 1969 and 134 this year.
