Dr. Cole noted that even though there are a few beds, and there is a need for level three beds, he had never run into operators not sending a sick person to hospital. In the case of Cher's, Dr. Cole testified, whenever he mentioned to Mrs. Cherwoniak that someone should be sent on to a greater care level home, the operator accused him of harassing rather than having the interest of the resident in mind.

Dr. Cole stated families should be made fully aware of the patients' conditions.

The medical health officer said the Public Health Act gives him sweeping powers. If he wanted to make daily inspections of the homes, he would be allowed, but that would be interfering with his other priorities.

Mrs. Cherwoniak told the jury there were three bedrooms downstairs and seven upstairs in her rest home. Both she and her husband Brian are employed full-time at the home. While she has no formal training in the care of the elderly, Mrs. Cherwoniak said, she had extensive experience working in other rest homes.

During the second day of the hearing Mrs. Cherwoniak said she informed Scott's family several times about the bed sores he was developing and recommended that he be moved to a more intense type of care.

Despite her urgings, however, both Scott and his family wanted him to remain at the rest home "so I told her that I would do the best I could for her father."

Mrs. Cherwoniak added that during the last 10 days Scott was in her care he was given sheep skin blankets and an inflatable ring to take pressure off the bed-sores, but there was very little else that could be done for him.

"You can't help these people if they start to go down and their family want you to keep them and they want to stay," she said.

In their verdict the jurors recommended that uniform provincial standards be provided for all rest homes, especially to clarify the role and responsibility of the operators, staffing requirements, control of medications, physical standards for the home itself and the maintenance of health records and regular health assessments of the residents.

They also recommended that some clarity be provided to the role of the local Medical Officer of Health, especially in providing inspections of the facilities and of the residents.

In setting these standards, however, legislators should also consider the increased costs and possible threat to individual freedom they added.

After the inquest, Gerald Punnett, lawyer for the Cherwoniks said he felt they had been "exonerated" by the verdict.

"I think the evidence that was brought out adequately answered all of the concerns that have been raised about the standard of care being provided by Cher's," he said.

"The evidence clearly showed that Scott received good care and that the facilities of the rest home are good. I think they have been completely exonerated," he said.

"The evidence presented here gave everyone with doubts about the quality of care at Cher's Rest Home a chance to air their doubts and everybody has agreed that everything is in order.

"It is clear that everything that could have been done for Scott was done," he said.

Halton Crown Attorney Jim Treleven said the recommendation of the jury would be forwarded to the chief coronor for Ontario and then to the appropriate bodies, such as the provincial Ministry of Health.
