Sabres lose two, 21-7 deficit, two goalies face 136 shots

The Acton Junior "B" Sabres were pounded over the weekend losing on Friday night in Burlington 9-0 and at home on Saturday night the Sabres were hammered 12-7 by Milton.

In the two games the Acton goalies Chris Martin and Robbie Ruffino were shelled with 136 shots showing, as coach Bill Richmond says, there were too many give aways in their own end and not enough checking. On Saturday night the Sabres gave the puck away 60 times in their own end that's one giveaway a minute.

Coach Richmond said the team took a lot of stupid penalties. The players weren't playing disciplined hockey which showed there was still a lot of work to be done and if changes are needed they'll be made.

Assistant coach Doug Bonesteel said he hoped "Santa" was going to be good to the Sabres this year and noted that the Sabre team is young and with hard work they would be just as competitive as the rest of the league. Doug also pointed out the Sabres were about a month behind the rest of the teams in the league since Acton had to wait to get their ice and start to work on their program. Bonesteel feels by the end of November the Sabres will be in shape and their systems will be working better. Richmond also says they're still looking for one more defenceman and one right winger.

Friday night in Burlington the Acton Sabres were outshot 62-29 by the Cougars as Ruffino and Martin shared the goaltending.

On Saturday night at home the Sabres were close until the third period when Milton outscored Acton 7-2.

At the end of the first period the Steamers led 2-1. Milton scored first at the 12:10 mark and then 30 seconds later went ahead 2-0. At 16:32 Pat Bates brought the Sabres to within one. Ken Kavanagh and Bob Boldt picked up assists. The Steamers outshot Acton in the first period 16-10.

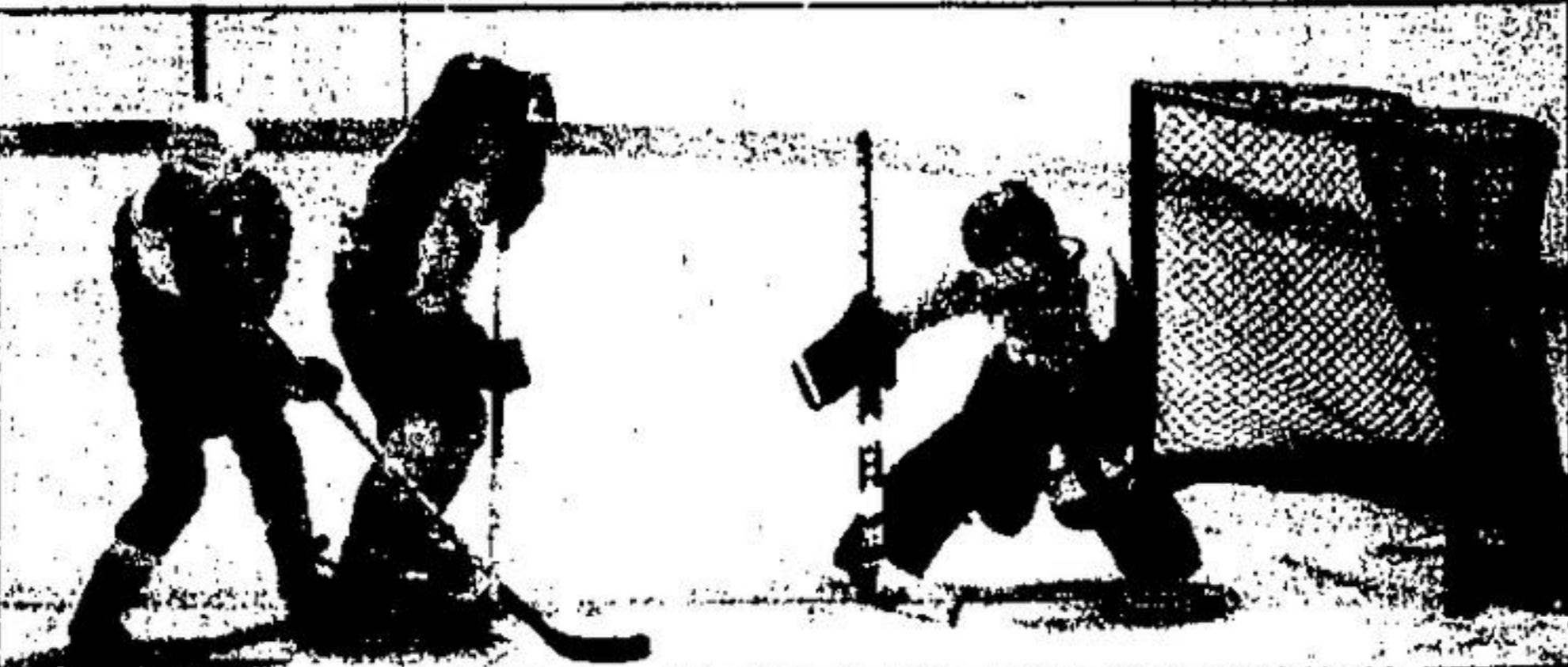

The season's scheduled curling starts on November 1 with mixed curling Monday,

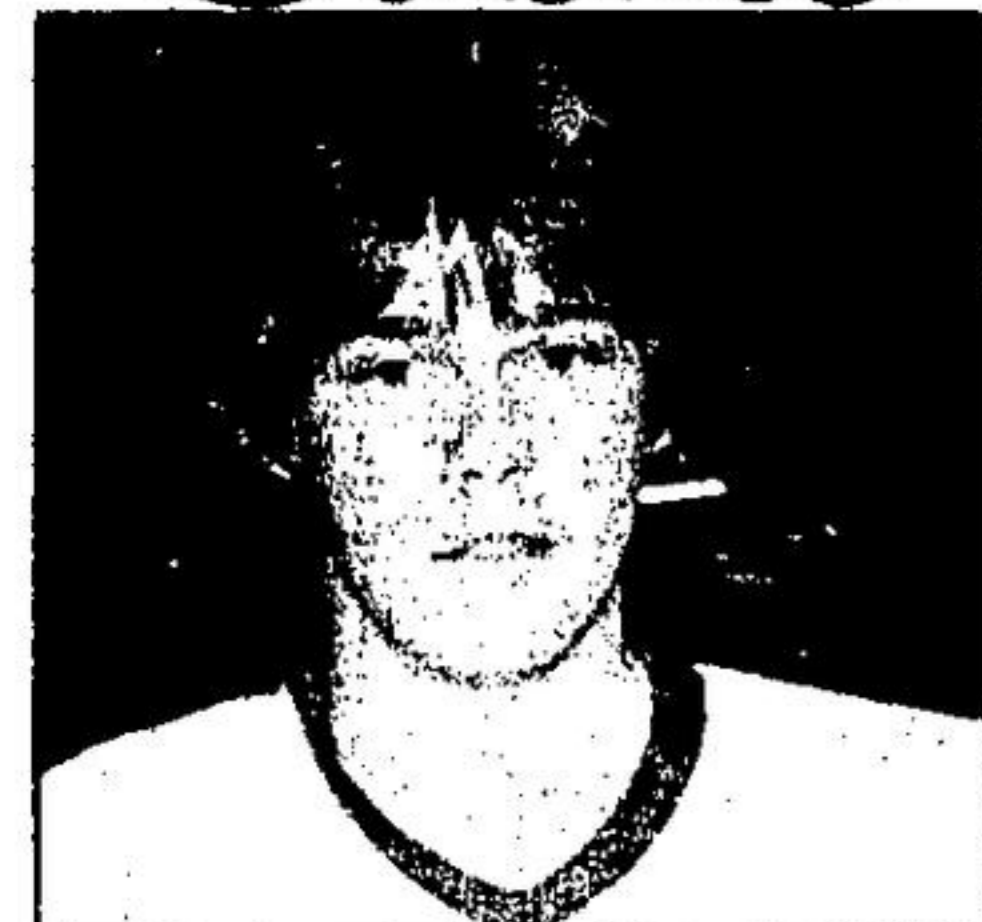
